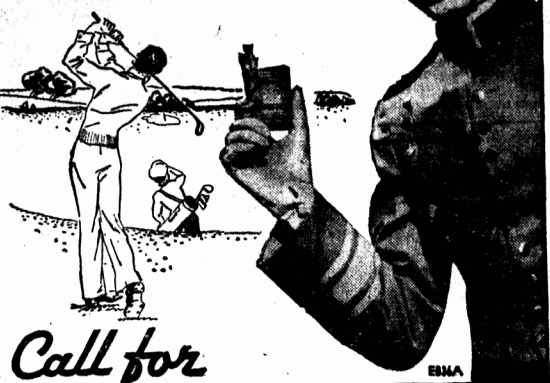

Montague Lieutenant Governor J. A. Bernard has proclaimed this week "Brighten Up Week" for the Province. Our town is known as "Montague the Beautiful" but there remains opportunity for improvement.
