THE COOK'S CORNER

PINEAPPLE RHUBARB JAM
Seven pounds rhubarb, 2 medium-sized pineapples, 5 pounds sugar.

Method: Get rhubarb as red as possible for this. Wash it and chop into 1-2-inch lengths. Cut the round end from the pineapple, stand it upright and twist off the top. Cut off the skin from top to bottom with a sharp knife, following the curve of the fruit and cutting about half the depth of the eyes. Remove the remainder of the eyes with a sharp-pointed knife. Cut the pineapple meat into small pieces.

Mix the fruits thoroughly with half the sugar. Bring slowly to the boiling point, and then boil for 5 minutes. Add the remainder of the sugar and continue cooking slowly until the fruit is clear, stirring frequently to prevent scorching on the bottom. Pour the mixture at once into hot sterilized jars and seal.

STRAWBERRY JELLY
(New Way)

Crush thoroughly or grind about 3 quarts fully ripe strawberries. Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze the juice. Squeeze and strain juice from 1 medium lemon. Measure 8 cups sugar and berry juice and 2 tablespoons lemon juice into saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over heat, and at once add 1 bottle fruit

CLEANING SPOT ON RUGS IS PROBLEM
A good rug deserves all the care the owner can give it. And that means taking out a spot as soon as it appears.

Grease stains are the first places attacked by moths. Usually they can be taken out with a mild soap and water, rinsing the soap out thoroughly.

Blood stains are best removed with clear cold water, no soap. Don't saturate the rug; just drop water on with an eye dropper, work into the pile with a clean rag, then blot with a blotter or sponge.

Remove ink by first blotting up all wet ink possible. Then drip lukewarm water on the spot with an eye dropper, working into the pile and blotting as you work, taking care not to rub. When the blotter shows no more ink, that is probably all the ink you can get out. If stain remains you'll have to get rug cleaned.

A new cigarette lighter sounds very good for use in the wind, or to give as a present to a man who smokes a pipe. A standard wick, flint and wick produce a regular flame to light the cigarette. By tipping the lighter toward one side so that the flame touches the end of a tiny copper tube, the flame is made to shoot toward either the cigarette or the bowl of the pipe. The lighter is made of chrome and finished in leather.

Codfish Cakes
