—ANNUAL MEETING.—The officers of the Kensington Driving Park Association held their annual meeting Wednesday. The business arranged showed a condition of affairs most satisfactory. —MR. JOHN CAMPBELL'S PLUCKY ACTION.—At a great risk of his own life, Mr. John Campbell, Street Commissioner, saved the six year old son of Mr. Stirling Phillips from drowning on Saturday morning. The incident occurred opposite the Hall Manufacturing Company's premises. Mr. Campbell, who was accompanied by others noticed that two children were playing on the thin ice had broken through. Prompt measures were immediately taken. While a number of planks were being arranged in succession towards the point where the children were struggling in the water one of the youngsters managed to get a firm hold and struggled to safety. The Phillips child, though, was at the point of drowning when Mr. Campbell having realized that the

planking was insufficient and that personal risk alone could effect a rescue, went on over the thin ice and plunging into the cold water, with considerable difficulty got the child to safety. There was no doubt that his plucky action averted a tragic fatality. After being taken to a nearby house the youngster was revived. Both children have recovered from their adventure while Mr. Campbell seems none the worse for his submerison.

In Memoriam

JAMES H. McLEAN

There died quite suddenly, after an illness of only about twenty-four hours, at Hermantville, on Saturday evening, a prominent farmer of the place, James H. McLean in the 68th year of his age. The deceased had, up to the day before his death been a strong and busy man, possessed of great physique and energy. Mr. McLean was one of the biggest farmers and land owners in the settlement. His home farm contained 150 acres while he owned 100 acres of lumber land on the Souris Line Road, or 250 acres of prime land in all. He carried on farming on an extensive scale, being one of the largest growers of oats in Eastern King's. He had probably the best set of modern farm implements to be found on any up-to-date farm in the country, and plenty of horse-power to run them, and, unfortunately leaves no sons to succeed him.

Mr. McLean was a strong politician, being a most aggressive liberal all his life. In the past thirty years he represented one or other liberal candidate of the Souris Line Poll, and before the days of the ballot was in the midst of many a stormy scene at the polls on election day though never profiting pecuniarily by his aggressive liberalism. Mr. McLean was twice married, first to Clementina McDonald, by whom he had several sons (all now dead) and a number of daughters, three of whom are living, Mrs. Dunphy, Boston; Katie Ann, Boston, and Mrs. Javis Hennessey, Hermantville. He married his second wife, Mary Doucette, about ten years ago, but have no issue. The latter, and his son-in-law, Hennessey, are the beneficiaries of his last will and testament. His remains were conveyed to St. Margaret's church and cemetery on Monday afternoon, where funeral services were conducted by the pastor Rev. Father McPherson, who also offered a Mass for the repose of his soul on Tuesday morning, Monday being a church holiday, Feast of the Immaculate Conception. The funeral was large and representative. Dr. McDonald, Souris, and Father McPherson, were both with him in his last illness.

MRS. CHARLES C. CARMODY

Many friends in this province will learn with regret of the death which occurred Tuesday at Joliette, P. Q. of Jean, beloved wife of Mr. Charles C. Carmody, formerly of this city.

Mrs. Carmody was the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip H. Howatt of Charlottetown, and formerly of Cape Traverse. She had been ill for some time with pleurisy, but it was not thought to be serious, and her death at the early age of sixteen years, comes as a shock to her parents and brother Frank. Her sister, Miss Mayme, was with her during the past three weeks. The deceased prior to her marriage six months ago, was an employee of Patons, Ltd. and was very popular with the young people in this city.
