The church at York was crowded Sunday evening to hear Rev. G. F. Dawson, the newly appointed minister to the York circuit. The sermon which was based on Romans 15:20 was ably delivered and must have created a good expression on the large congregation present. In conclusion he asked for the sympathy, prayer and co-operation of all those identified with the church.

Mrs. Scott, wife of our town engineer, who has been spending a week in town, returned to Charlottetown, where she and family will remain for the summer, being unable to get a house here until the autumn. She was accompanied by Master Wilber McArthur, little son of Rev. A. McArthur who goes to spend the summer with his grandparents in Summerside. -New Glasgow Ex.

S. S. Stanley arrived in Pictou on Friday last to load coal and supplies for the Marconi stations at Gulf shore points, and is about ready to leave port. The station at Fano Point is already in working order and communication was effected therefrom with the S. S. Parisian on her recent outward voyage from Montreal. The workmen are now at East Point, Anticosti, where the Stanley is to sail for.

A WINNIPEG paper publishes the following somewhat remarkable story: "In August, 1903, five stalwart young men of Scotch nationality, from Prince Edward Island, arrived in Plum Couler, Man. Though entire strangers they were immediately engaged to labor for Peter Siemens, a Mennonite, 1 1/2 miles south of town. A few days after while working in the field, one of them lost his pocket book. They searched for it in vain, and as it contained a considerable sum of money they were the more anxious to find it. They returned to Prince Edward Island, carrying with them the good wishes of their employer. On June 10, this year, Mr. Siemens, while plowing, noticed something of a peculiar shape, picked it up and found it to be the lost pocketbook in a very dilapidated condition, but the money though paper, was in perfect condition. Mr. Siemens brought it to the post office and desired it to be sent to the man, but not remembering his name he described him, as the young man got so strong as the others as he had been a teacher. The post mistress, after some search found the address, and the pocket book containing just what the easterner said he lost was duly registered to P. E. I. though much the worse in appearance for its winter outing in Manitoba."

The Ottawa correspondent of the St. John Sun says: "There was considerable debate in the House over the item of \$85,000 to increase accommodation at Charlottetown, in which several Island members took a prominent part. Mr. Hackett by means of pertinent questions succeeding in extracting from the minister some definite information as to this grant, which would not otherwise have been laid before the house. Mr. Hazzard backed Mr. Hackett's line of treatment with good effect. Later on, when a vote of \$630,000 was asked for the Murray Harbor branch and Hillsboro, P. E. I. bridge, Hon. Mr. Emmerson said the estimated cost of the bridge is \$1,494,007; the estimated cost of the branch to the river is \$926,400; of rolling stock, \$200,000; of the extension to the harbor, \$404,000; of cribwork wharf at the harbor, \$80,035, making a total estimated cost of \$2,705,113. Of that there had been already expended \$2,072,525, leaving \$732,588 to be required for 1904-5. The department asked a revote of \$630,000 next year. Mr. Hackett urged the minister to proceed with the building of a branch line of railway from O'Leary to the west shore of Prince Edward Island a distance of about 12 miles, and in this connection read a copy of a resolution and petition to Hon. Mr. Emmerson passed at a large meeting in Lot 10 P. E. I. March 9th, urging the early construction of a branch line in the interest of that section of the province. Mr. Hackett was informed by the minister that the matter was receiving the consideration of the government.

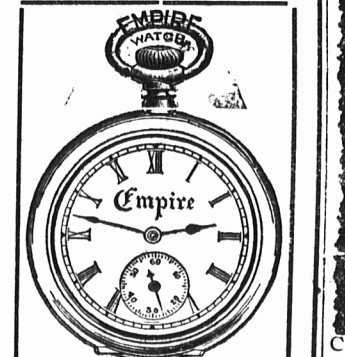
