ACADIA STARS ARE GETTING INTO FORM

Coach Fred Kelly Now Satisfied With New Material He Has Unearthed.

KENTVILLE, Oct. 2.—Only seven men of last year's Varsity squad were on hand today as Fred Kelly, starting his fifth year as head coach of football at Acadia, gave the order to clear the decks for action. For the past week, members of last season's squad have been hard at work under the direction of Coach Kelly and Captain Howie Ryan. Prospects for a fair-to-average team, which have appeared exceedingly slim, took a decided boost today with the return of two former Varsity stars, Jim Hubley, 200 pound scrum man and Fred Munroe, former forward and utility backfield star. Both men, who graduated in 1929, played on the Varsity team from 1924 to 1928. They returned to take post graduate courses. Brock Montgomery, of Bathurst, Cliff Murray, of Sydney, members of last year's forward line, turned out for practice this afternoon. Also present were, Somers of Moncton, Capt. of last year's intermediate team and Duncan MacKenzie, Sydney, Varsity basketball star and sub half on the Varsity football team. Kelly is having a tough time. His biggest problem is to replace the brilliant 1929 three quarter line of Matthews, Buckley, Wilson and Eville, all missing this year. Things are, however, not showing up so bad. Ralston, a former St. John High School star and John Eaton and Lawrence Smith, formerly of Wolfville High School, have shown up mighty well in practice. Christie, a husky youngster from Amherst Academy, is also shaping up well. Three new students from the United States are also showing good form. Their tackling is deadly but they display a weakness in the passing game. Howie Ryan, Mont Cain and Stu Laurie, remaining members of last year's backfield, are going great.

CONVICTED ON THEFT CHARGE
—Charged with theft of a suitcase containing articles valued at less than \$10 an Indian from St. Andrews, taken into custody by the Provincial Police, appeared before Magistrate D. Edgar Shaw, K.C., yesterday afternoon, and was convicted and sentenced to two months in jail under conditions. The theft, it is alleged, took place on the tram at Scotchfort Station on Tuesday, Sept. 30. The first witness testified that he had been on board the train with the accused on the way from Charlottetown to Scotchfort on Tuesday last. On arrival at Scotchfort, a man on the train, the witness stated, asked accused if that was his suitcase. Accused answered in the affirmative, and took the suitcase from the train. Later he broke it open, and left it in the woods, and continued on to his home. Constable Jay, of the Provincial Police, stated that he had been sent out to investigate the matter of the missing suitcase, and related the discovery of some of the articles, one of which was on the person of the accused, who admitted the theft to him before he was placed under arrest. Some of the articles which were in the suitcase, a razor and fountain pen, had not been recovered at the time of the trial. The accused after due warning by the Magistrate, consented to be tried summarily by him and pleaded guilty to the charge.

Athletics Win Two Straight

St. Louis No Match For Philadelphia—Cardinals Were Steam-rolled Into 6 to 1 Defeat.

(Canadian Press) SHIBE PARK, Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 2.—The World's champion Athletics steamrollered the Cardinals today with another heavy hitting attack, knocking Flint Rhem out of the box and capturing their second straight world's series victory by the score of six to one. George Earnshaw, big right hander, held the National League to six hits and struck out eight before another capacity crowd of 32,266 fans, who contributed to a "gate" of \$152,735, exactly duplicating the figures for the opening game. The "Mackmen" scored a convincing triumph and prepared to leave for St. Louis and the third game there on Saturday with a commanding margin of "two up and two to go."

CHAUTAQUA CLOSED LAST EVENING

Enlightening Lecture By Judge Frank Travers On Crime.

"Crime and Criminals," as dealt with by Judge Frank Travers at Chautauqua last evening, was a most interesting subject to the large audience that attended the final evening's program. As a prelude to the address, and as entertainers on the afternoon program the Swiss Alpine Serenaders were much appreciated.

The three talented Swiss ladies composing the group brought a splendid repertoire of songs, and Swiss music. Yodeling was an added interesting feature. The Junior Chautauqua games were also carried on in the afternoon.

Among the interesting facts related by Judge Travers in his lecture was the statement that Prince Edward Island has a smaller percentage of juvenile delinquency according to population than has any other English speaking area in the world.

Judge Travers stated that he has spent sixteen years in the Courts of U. S. A. and was later a member of a crime commission, in which capacity he studied crime disguised as a convict in a penitentiary. Crime, Judge Travers said, is on the increase and the average age of the criminal is becoming lower. Now it is 22. More than one half the criminals of United States are less than nineteen years of age. Crime is organized in United States, much as laboring

men are organized and crime in Canada and United States is costing those countries fourteen billion dollars yearly. The speaker did not believe in brutal punishment for criminals. He advocated more certainty of punishment rather than more severity of punishment. There should be no delays. The prompt execution of justice is the secret of the success of criminal law in England. A system of majority judgment of the jury, the judge believed, would eliminate the danger of jurymen being bought. There should be no appeal except on a basis of guilt or innocence. Technicalities, not affecting the issue, should not be allowed to affect convictions.

The importance of a good environment for the prevention of juvenile delinquency and as training for citizenship was stressed by the speaker. Opportunity often comes for men to take children off the highways and train them to be good citizens. Even the worst child can be trained to be at least a mediocre citizen. Judge Travers remarked that he never found in prison boys who had belonged to the Boy Scouts. The child should be above the dollar in the estimation of men.

Minister was greeted several times by cheers.

"Before us," said Mr. Bennett, "lies the task of Empire consolidation and with that task we meet in the heart of this great unit."

Mr. Bennett was cheered when he declared the nations of the Empire were not yet bankrupt in statesmanship. Men and women occupying a quarter of the land surface of the globe and comprising a quarter of its population were still capable, by guidance and leadership of achievement in the future what they had already achieved, namely, the economic solidarity of the Empire which was as capable of achievement as the development of their constitutional liberties had been.

Prince Arthur of Connaught, President

H. R. H. Prince Arthur of Connaught, former Governor-General of South Africa, presided at the banquet.

"We welcome your presence in London as affording one more opportunity of mutual enlightenment and the inspiration coming from such contacts," Prince Arthur said on behalf of the gathering.

"We, who have so much to learn, could wish these opportunities occurred more frequently, though possibly the Prime Ministers with their overwhelming responsibilities, have other views on that."

"We follow keenly your deliberations," he continued, causing a smile when he added—So far as, perhaps, an inevitable and, shall I say, an official reticence will admit."

General Hertzog, Prime Minister of South Africa, believed that commonwealth co-operation was the very life of the Commonwealth itself. Co-operation could not thrive in an atmosphere of suspicion; it would positively stagnate under a feeling of wrong. The declaration of 1926 Imperial Conference proclaiming the independence and freedom of South Africa, as well as of the other Dominions, had removed a feeling of wrong and suspicion under which the Union had for years labored. General Hertzog asked, with a smile, whether other Dominions—or even Scotsmen—had never sought refuge from a national wrong by contemplating, if not threatening, to cut the painter.

The greater the freedom the closer the ties was the view expressed by Hon. James Scullin, Prime Minister of Australia.
