Legion Christmas Tree Reported Huge Success

The Legion Christmas Tree in the store of Moore & McLeod Ltd. succeeded far beyond the wildest dreams of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, The Contact Club and the Overseas Nursing Sisters Association, who sponsored the appeal, Major A. W. Rogers, President of the Legion, said yesterday.

The response from the citizens was magnificent and the veterans' gaily bags were delivered to the thoughtfulness and generosity of the public. After being filled to overflowing by volunteer workers at the Legion Home these duty bags were delivered to the veterans in the Veterans Wing of the P. E. I. Hospital, to the City Hospital, Provincial Sanatorium, Falconwood Hospital, The Sacred Heart Home and the Provincial Infirmary in the midst of a storm on Christmas Eve through the kindness of the Commanding Officer of the 17th Recce Regt. (Lt. Col. W. W. Reid, D.S.O.) who placed a truck at the disposal of the Canadian Legion for that purpose.

In addition to the hundreds of gifts placed beneath the tree, gifts of money approximating \$200 were received from Garrison Officers' Mess, Garrison Sergeants' Mess, H. M. C. S. Queen Charlotte Canteen, Charlottetown, Borden and Morell Branches of the Canadian Legion, The United Services Officers' Club, The Charlottetown Club, The Boys on Strike, (Canada Packers) and from many citizens. Gifts purchased from local stores with this money were added to the huge amount of parcels for the hospitalized and shut-in veterans. A conservative estimate of the number of parcels sent out to veterans in hospitals outside the province, hospitals and institutions in the province and to shut-in veterans at home would be over 700.

It was a happy day for the veterans who were surprised at the quantity and quality of the gifts. In addition to each receiving a serviceable gift parcel, baskets of apples and oranges and packages of cigarettes were distributed. Summed up by one of the best Christmas ever.

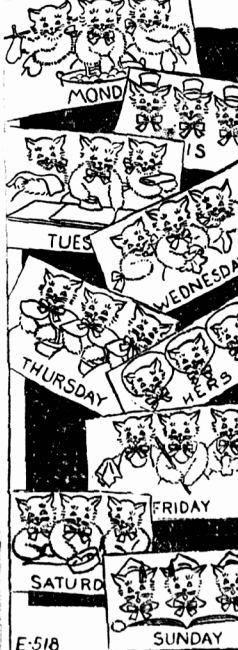

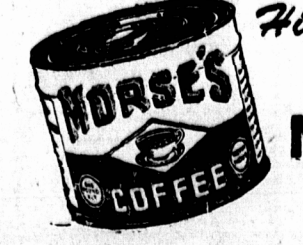
