The funeral was held Sunday morning at 12:30 o'clock from his late residence to the Mt. Stewart Cemetery, Rev. R. P. Murray conducting the services. There was a large attendance, showing the esteem in which the deceased was held. The following were the pall-bearers: F. Callaghan, R. McGurk, Philip Coyle, E. Jay, C. Birt, P. Rogerson.

A man who was under the influence of liquor fell from the roof of the C. R. station on Saturday about 12:30 o'clock. The stranger walked upstairs in the station and got out on the roof. Owing to throat trouble the pastor was unable to take the services on the Pownal Circuit on Sunday, but Emsen Hargrove, Charlottetown, of the Salvation Army, being appealed to, very kindly consented to officiate. He spoke in the Pownal Church morning and evening very acceptably in the morning from the words, "God is love," earnestly showing the great love of God to man, and that if every man and woman could understand and believe that God really loved them there would be a great gathering of souls, and in the evening he spoke very feelingly on "Mothers' love and influence, and the great love of Christ for perishing souls." Charlottetown is up-to-date in its respect at least—it has a thoroughly sanitary appliance for drinking on its public fountain. In other cities the public drinking cup is a source of discussion and it will be of interest to here quote an exchange on the subject: The campaign against the common drinking cup is gathering strength all over the world. Its leaders have captured many cities, but the capitulation of New York is probably the greatest surprise. Under the ordinances of the Board of Health of that city the use of a common drinking cup for water in a public institution, hotel, theatre, library, hall, school, railway station or ferry house will be illegal after October of this year. Already some of the public schools have been equipped with a jet apparatus, so arranged that the drinker's lips do not come in contact with any part of the machinery. The use of such devices is likely to increase greatly. A number of railroads have adopted a paper cup, supplied to the thirsty on payment of a small fee. This innovation is entirely praiseworthy, and the reform might be extended to cover a number of other matters. Is there a restaurant in the town in which glasses after being used receive water and wiping with a towel that has already been used for considerable service? The manner in which dispensers of soda water make a "lick and a promise" serve for washing, is apparent to all. There is no reason to believe that the drinking vessels used in restaurants and other soda counters are even approximately clean.

Capt. F. W. L. Moore, city, left yesterday morning for Vancouver, where he has been transferred.

The C. G. S. Stanley leaves Halifax today for this port and on her arrival here will take up the larger buoys and place them in position around the P. E. Island coast.

The marriage took place at Christ Church, Vancouver, B. C., on Saturday, April 15th, 1911, of Miss Alberta Taylor Reagh, daughter of the Venerable Archdeacon Reagh and Mrs. Reagh of this Province, and John P. MacGachan, of Calgary, Alberta. The bride, who was unattended, wore a travelling costume of grey opalescent satin and silver net, and wore a hat to match. Immediately after the ceremony, which was performed by the Rev. C. C. Owen, Mr. and Mrs. MacGachan left for Victoria, where they spent a short time before returning to their new home in Calgary.

A petition to the Minister of Justice was put in circulation this morning on behalf of Capt. Dicks of the schooner Mhantonomah, who is now serving a four year sentence for perjury. Dicks was convicted in February and sentenced by Judge Lawrence. The perjury charge arose out of the statements he made in the course of his trial for assaulting a minor from St. Pierre. The petition recites Capt. Dicks' general good reputation, and urges that his wife, and family of small children are now dependent upon the support of others and that it is really they who are being punished. A peculiar thing about the petition is that it is being recited by provincial constable Edwards who arrested Dicks on the charge that sent him to Dorchester.—Sydney Ex. (Capt. Dicks is well known in this Province.)

A despatch from Dawson, N. B., says: The council called by the Ladies' Street St. John Baptist Church to inquire into the serious charges that have been made against the character of their pastor, and to advise the church, met yesterday afternoon and evening with the deacon and clerk of the church. The council was an unusually large one, and was composed of the ministers and laymen. The charges made by Mrs. Susie Maxwell were first heard, and since taken from both sides, and all the facts regarding the case were reviewed by the complete exonerated of the pastor, Rev. W. R. Robinson, the unanimous verdict of the council being that the charges were not sustained. The further charges against Capt. J. H. Crossley were then reviewed, who was not ready with his evidence and had not his witnesses at hand. The council will convene in two months—this afternoon, Mr. Robinson's friends in this Province will be glad to learn of his exoneration.
