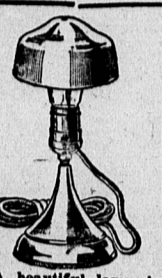

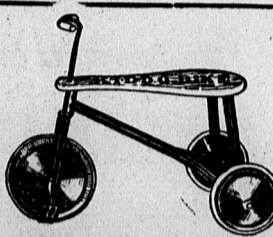

RECORD SAVINGS

LONDON, Dec. 21 - Sales of National Savings Certificates during the year ended March 31 last, were the highest for any year since 1921-22. The year's total, with an average of 1,213,303 per week, amounted to 63,091,772.

This was an increase of 10,487,822 over the previous year, and the cash value of 250,473,418 represented an increase of 28,374,258.

There was a remarkable decrease in the value of certificates presented for repayment. The amount repaid, exclusive of interest, was 236,911,967, which was 28,384,698 less than during the previous year.

The estimated total amount due to holders of certificates at March 31, last including accrued interest, was 2,493,000,000. Scotland bought 5,362,824, the cash value being 24,290,259. As in previous years, the school associations showed the largest measure of growth. Satisfactory progress was also made in the Army, the Central Army Association now having 227 branches.

The 3600 tickets sold were placed in a churn which was then revolved by Mr. Angus McEachern, Fire Chief. Before the drawing Mr. McEachern announced that no fireman or member of a fireman's family had been permitted to hold tickets for the raffle. Also that the contest had been limited to residents of this province. The drawing was done by Miss Mary Trainor, daughter of Mr. J. Austin Trainor. Miss Trainor was blindfolded and led to the churn from which she drew the lucky ticket, number 1075 which was held by Mr. E. R. Brow. Chief McEachern then thanked the people for their generous support of the enterprise. He stated that the lottery brought in about \$225 for the Firemen's Uniform Fund. The amount on hand at present is about \$425 or nearly half the objective.

Rotarians Hear Address On Christmas

That Christmas is the greatest birthday anniversary of the year, and throws its rays from November right up until January, that it is an assumed day, that no Christian church holds that the actual birthday of Christ was Dec. 25th, but that there has been good authority cited for observing the birthday of Christ in any other month of the year except December, that back of all the one real fact must be kept in mind, that Christ was born, were among the statements made by His Excellency, the Right Rev. Dr. O'Sullivan, Bishop of Charlottetown, in addressing the Rotarians at their weekly luncheon yesterday.

In dealing historically with the origin of Christmas Day, he said that the observance of Christmas Day as the Lord's birthday was accepted in Europe first in 354. It was known under different names by different nations. Christmas is the English word, Il Natale the Italian, and Noel the French. It was mentioned in literature in the year 1038. His Excellency said that at the time Christianity was admitted as a public religion and so proclaimed by the Emperor Constantine, that a large part of the population was pagan in heart and mind so that December 25th, which had been hitherto celebrated by the pagans as the birthday of the Unequaled One, came to be celebrated by the Christians as the birthday of the real Son of God. His Excellency then spoke of the social customs associated with the day, stating that in England the day took on most charming characteristics where the idea of a good meal with plum pudding, mince pies, etc became dominant. The speaker pointed out that there is a danger of people overcommercializing Christmas and losing the spirit that is back of it. Christmas should be considered as a joyful, cordial, blithesome and merry day. The speaker, who is a former Rotarian, received a very hearty greeting at yesterday's meeting, and his eloquent and interesting address was received with prolonged applause.

Ermine Opera Wrap Supplants Cassock

TORONTO, Dec. 21 - An opera wrap of cotton batting dotted with iodine to simulate ermine had something to do with the fact that Nova Scotia didn't produce one more minister. But its' all most respectable.
