Britain Lends Largely Abroad

LONDON, Sept. 12.—The ability of British industry in the days when we could rightly term ourselves the workshop of the world to finance its own developments and extensions without much recourse to outside help led directly to the success of London as an international banking centre, writes Francis Williams in the Daily Herald.

MERCHANT BANKERS

And so the financiers and merchant bankers turned their attention overseas and embarked on large-scale foreign financing. The British investor was persuaded to lend his money abroad. By doing so he received substantial profits, while some, at any rate of the money so lent came back here in the form of orders for British machinery and British goods.

FOREIGN OUTLOOK

And more and more the eyes of a large part of the city were turned across the seas, and less and less did it concern itself with the affairs of British industry. British industry did not worry about that, considering itself well able to look after its own affairs, and having plenty of money wherewith to put its belief in the practical test.

When History Repeats

But when British industry and agriculture turns to the city for assistance it finds that, perhaps inevitably in the circumstances, the organization of the great finance houses and merchant bankers has been designed mainly to assist foreign, not British, borrowers. They have created an organization and a relationship between themselves and foreign borrowers which does not exist, or exists only in a very few cases, between finance and British industry.

Signal Company Medal Shoot

With a cold, blustery, northwest wind blowing, and anything but favorable shooting conditions prevailing, the eight "Big Shots" of no. 1 Signal Company, 6th Div. Signal went over the 200, 500, and 600 yard distances at Kensington Rifle Range yesterday to decide the winner of the company's silver medal presented by the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

At the completion of the 200 and 500 it was still anybody's match, seven with 67 each and one with 66 going back to the final range. However, when the battle finished it was found that Q. M. S., J. Stewart Moore who had a lowly 32 at the 200 had finished brilliantly with a perfect score at both the 500 and 600, thereby winning the match and the much coveted medal, with a score of 102.

Under the conditions the scoring was exceptionally high, the low man having a 98, good enough to win an ordinary match. The aggregate of the eight was 795, which total is 13 points higher than the highest score ever made in the Inter-Maritime match which is shot annually by 8 picked men representing each province, the existing Inter-Maritime record being 782 which was made this year at Sussex, N. B. by the Nova Scotia team. The following are the scores:—

Vessel Nears Baffin Land

GOVERNMENT SURVEY SHIP RETURNS TO CHURCHILL AFTER 2,000-MILE TRIP.

CHURCHILL, Sept. 12.—Completing what is said to have been a new record in far north sailing, the S.S. Ocean Eagle, Government survey ship, in command of Captain William Poole, returned to port yesterday after a 17 day voyage into the Foxe Basin regions. The Eagle steamed near the southern extremity of Cockburn Land, east and slightly south of the magnetic pole.

It is stated that no steamer of the proportions of the Eagle had sailed so far north in that area east of Baffin Island.

The voyage was reported uneventful. In approximately 2,000 miles of travel the crew saw no humans. The only signs of life were seal, walrus and a few polar bears.

The S.S. Grethard of London, sailed at noon yesterday for Cardiff with 246,000 bushels of grain.

The motor schooner Fort Severn, Hudson's Bay Company, docked here from the north with mail and fur.

Labor Congress Resolutions Re Sweepstakes

HAMILTON, Sept. 12.—Labor wants sweepstakes and licensed sale of beer. In no uncertain terms, the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, representative of 300,000 workers, today went on record as being in favor of sweepstakes, no matter what the proceeds would be used for, and for the sale of beer licensed places. The Ontario Government, despite the recent statement of Prem. Geo. S. Henry some days ago that the people would not be asked to vote on the question of allowing hotels to sell beer and wine, will be petitioned by the Trades and Labor Congress again. The Dominion Government will again be asked to permit labor unions, hospitals and other organizations to run sweepstakes.
