AMENDMENTS TO PROHIBITION ACT

To be Submitted to the Legislature at the Present Session—The Object to Make the Law More Stringent and Thus More Effective for the Public Good.

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island as follows:

An Act to amend "The Prohibition Act, 1900" and passed in the year 1902 is hereby repealed and the following substituted in lieu thereof:

Sub-section Four of section 4 of "The Prohibition Act, 1900" is hereby repealed and the following substituted in lieu thereof:

Provided also that the sale of intoxicating liquors for exclusively medicinal purposes or for bona fide use in some art, trade or manufacture, may be made also by legally qualified chemists and druggists but not exceeding ten ounces at any one sale and for exclusively medicinal purposes only but such sale whether made by a vendor, chemist or druggist, for medicinal purposes, shall be made only on prescription or certificate of a duly qualified resident physician affirming that such liquor has been prescribed for the person named therein for use as a medicine and not as a beverage, and no more than one sale or delivery of liquor shall be made on such certificate or prescription, and when such sale is for its use in some art, trade or manufacture, the same shall be made only on a certificate signed by an Inspector appointed under the provisions of this Act, of the good faith of the application accompanied by the affirmation of the applicant that the liquor is to be used only for the particular purpose set forth in the affirmation, and such vendors, chemists and druggists shall file the certificates and keep a register of all sales made by them indicating the name of the purchaser and the quantity sold and shall make a monthly return under oath of all sales, on the first day of each month in each year to the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, stating the name of the Doctor who granted the certificate and of the person to whom the liquor was sold, and shall attest thereto by oath before the said Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, his Deputy or a duly qualified clerk of the County Court. And any vendor, druggist or chemist who neglects or refuses to file such returns as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of an offence against this Act and shall be liable to a penalty of ten dollars for the first offence and for every second or subsequent offence to a penalty of twenty dollars. And every Inspector appointed under this Act shall have the right to visit the Chemists, Druggists and Vendors and examine their certificates and their register of all such sales and to see they are properly filed and recorded. And any physician who gives such a certificate for any other than strictly medicinal purposes shall be guilty of an offence against this Act and shall be liable for the first offence to a penalty of twenty dollars and for a second and any subsequent offence to a penalty of forty dollars. Provided further that no vendor, chemist or druggist shall permit any liquor to be drunk on the premises of such vendor, chemist or druggist under a penalty not exceeding twenty dollars to be enforced under section 11 of the said Act. Any action for the recovery of any of the penalties imposed under this section may be brought in the name of the Inspector, Prosecutor, City Marshal or in the name of any person and the penalties when recovered shall be paid and disposed of in the same manner as for the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors under this Act.

The following sections are hereby added to the said "The Prohibition Act, 1900": (a) Any Stipendiary Magistrate for the city, town or county, if satisfied on the oath of any Police Officer, Policeman, Constable, Inspector or Prosecutor, that there is reasonable ground to believe that any liquor is sold or kept for sale contrary to the provisions of this Act in any place within his jurisdiction, may grant a warrant under his hand, by virtue whereof it shall be lawful for the person or persons named in such warrant at any time or times within ten days from the date thereof, to enter if need be by force the place named in the warrant and every part thereof and of the premises connected therewith, and to examine the same and search for liquor therein, and for such purposes such person may, if necessary, with such assistance as he deems expedient, break open any door, lock or fastenings of such premises or any part thereof, or of any closet, cupboard, box or other article suspected to contain any such liquor, and in the event of any liquors, beer-pumps, or other appliances or articles similar to those usually found in places where liquor is sold or kept for sale being so found on the said premises, the owner, the occupant thereof, the bartender or person apparently in charge of said premises shall, until the contrary is proven, be deemed to have kept for sale or made sale of liquors contrary to the provisions of this Act, and may be arrested by such officer or person having the search warrant as aforesaid and any person so arrested shall until the contrary be proven be deemed to have made sale or kept for sale liquor contrary to the provisions of this Act and may be fined and imprisoned therefor as provided in section 7 of this Act.

Should the owner of said liquors, beer-pumps, &c., not be arrested when the seizure is made then the fact of being owner of said liquors, beer-pumps, &c., shall be evidence sufficient in any future prosecution within three months to convict him of having kept for sale or sold liquors contrary to the provisions of this Act.

In all cases where liquors have been so seized and removed and the owner has not been arrested, then such liquors shall be stored by the officers making the seizure for a space of not less than thirty days, and if after the expiration of that time no person has proved the ownership thereof the Stipendiary Magistrate may declare all said liquors forfeited to His Majesty and to be destroyed.

When any Inspector, Policeman, Constable or Officer on making or attempting to make any search under or in pursuance of the authority conferred by this Act or under the warrant mentioned in this section, finds in any house or place where liquor is alleged to have been sold or kept for sale any liquor, malt beer or other liquors containing or supposed to contain by volume over 3% of alcohol he may forthwith seize and remove the same, and the vessels in which the same are kept, and upon the conviction of the bartender, occupant of such house or place, or any other person being a resident, occupant or owner of said house, for having kept for sale or having sold liquor contrary to the provisions of this Act, the Magistrate making such conviction may in and by the said conviction or by a separate or subsequent order declare the said liquor, malt beer or other liquors containing or supposed to contain over 3% of alcohol and the vessels or any part thereof to be forfeited to His Majesty and to be destroyed. Provided always that should any liquors seized as aforesaid be proved by the owner thereof, to the satisfaction of the Stipendiary Magistrate hearing the case, that they do not contain over 3% of alcohol by volume, then all such liquors shall be returned to the place from whence they had been seized and removed. And no liability shall be attached to the Stipendiary Magistrate who issued the writ or the officers or other persons who made the seizure for any loss or damage to the owner of said liquor or to any other person.

Any person who may interfere with any officer or officers in the discharge of their duties under the next two preceding sections shall be deemed to be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or three months imprisonment.

Nothing in this Act contained shall prohibit the sale by legally qualified chemists and druggists of drugs or medicines mixed with alcohol or spirituous liquors for purely medicinal purposes.

Section Four of "The Prohibition Act, 1900" is hereby amended by inserting the words "keep for sale" immediately after the word "device" in the fourth line of said section.

Any information to obtain a warrant under sub-section (a) of section 2 of this Act may be in the form "A" in the schedule to this Act and any search warrant under said sub-section may be in the form

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"B" in the said schedule. It shall be the duty of the Stipendiary Magistrate of any Town or City or County to examine upon oath all persons brought before him charged with being drunk and incapable, as to where or from whom they obtained the liquor which was partially or wholly the cause of the drunkenness. And a refusal to give such information to the satisfaction of the said Stipendiary Magistrate shall be deemed a contempt of court.

The giving of this information will not disqualify any such person from being a competent witness in any prosecution against the liquor seller.

The giving away of intoxicating liquors or any shifts or devices to evade the provisions of this Act shall be deemed an unlawful selling within the provisions of this Act.

Any itinerant person or runner who shall upon any of the streets, lanes or by-ways, of any City or Town in this Province or upon any high-ways, road, by-road, lane or any other place not hereinafter specially mentioned or described in this Act procure, sell, offer for sale, give or dispose of to any other person or persons any intoxicating liquor shall be deemed to have committed an offence against the provisions of this Act and may be dealt with in the same manner as offenders under section 7 of this Act.

It shall be no justification or excuse to any person prosecuted or proceeded against for an offence under the last preceding section that such sale, offer for sale, giving or disposing of said liquor was done as the agent, servant or friend of some third party.
