FUNERAL services over the remains of William A. Brehaut, late proofreader of the Post, were held Jan. 29th, at the residence of his brother, 23 Codman park, Roxbury. The Rev. J. J. Dunlop of the Roxbury Presbyterian Church officiated. The rooms were filled with relatives and friends, the latter including representatives from all the newspaper composing rooms in the city, Mt. Pleasant Lodge, I. O. O. F., Ellsion Encampment, I. O. O. F., and the Franklin Typographical Society. Beautiful floral offerings gave mute testimony to the esteem and affection in which the deceased was held. The body was entombed at Forest Hills, Boston Post Chapel, at a meeting Jan. 25th, adopted the following resolutions on the death of William A. Brehaut: "Whereas, the members of the Boston Post Chapel learn with profound sorrow of the death of our late friend and comrade, William A. Brehaut; be it Resolved, That while bowing to the inscrutable ways of Divine Providence, we desire to express the deep sense of loss we feel in the sudden death of one who in life was a conscientious, earnest and intelligent member of our craft, a true and devoted friend and comrade, a loving son, rother, husband, and father, and in all his life's relations absolutely guided by motives of the broadest and highest integrity; be it Resolved, That we extend to our late brother's relatives our deepest condolence in this, their hour of bereavement, but with them glory in the splendid life record made by our departed brother; be it Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of the Post Chapel, printed in the Boston Post and Typographical Journal, and a copy sent to the family of our departed comrade; be it Resolved, That, as a further mark of respect, The Post Chapel banner be draped for three months."—Boston Post. (Mr. Brehaut as previously stated belonged to Murray Harbor and was well known in Charlottetown and Summerside.

There passed peacefully away to her eternal rest at Marshfield on Jan 9th, Emily Harper, relict of the late John Godfrey in the 82nd year of her age. The deceased had been in failing health for many years past, and was taken suddenly ill a week previous to her death from which she did not rally, but gradually grew weaker and weaker until the Angel of Death touched the tender chord, and she passed into that great beyond to meet her God. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. G. R. White and were very so emn and impressive. Interment took place in Suffolk cemetery beside her husband and those of her family who preceded her. The deceased was the third of a family of ten, who were born at Bungay in the county of Suffolk, England. When a small girl she was among the pioneers who emigrated to this country in the year 1830, who succeeded in stumping, piling, burning and clearing the forests and making the desert to blossom as the rose. Tow often they have been seen at the dawn of day brushing with hasty steps the dew away to meet the sun upon the upland lawn and now they are laid away. The late Mrs. Godfrey was a Christian woman. She was a member of the Baptist church for over fifty years, had a most kindly nature, and was the most genial and companionable of women. Of sterling integrity and irreproachable character, she was a worthy descendant of our islands, pioneers, noble men and women, who lived honorable and Christian lives and died with the highest esteem and regard of all who knew them. Truly death is no rest of persons; old and young, rich and poor must all succumb to the inevitable. She leaves seven sons, three daughters, two brothers and two sisters besides a host of relatives and friends to mourn their loss. "After all it is better to die than to be born, for when born the battle is yet before you but in death it is fought and won. There is no death; although we grieve when beautiful familiar forms, that we have learned to love, are torn from our embracing arms, although with bowed and breaking heart, with sable garb and sombre tread, we bear their silent dust to rest and say that they are dead, they are not dead, they have but passed beyond the mists that bind us here, into the new and larger life of that serene sphere. And ever near us, though unseen, their dear immortal spirits tread; for all the boundless universe is life, there is no death."—Com.
