Some time ago the Guardian published a short account of a patriotic donation and sale held in Tryon on June 25th realizing, it was then stated, something over \$900. The total receipts have since been tabulated and are even larger than at first announced, totalling the handsome sum of \$987.74.

The affairs was engineered by the Tryon Branch of the National Service League and the response to their invitation for donations was most creditable as will be seen from the list below. 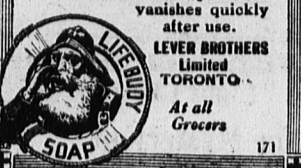
