Rev. W. Galloway, is doing good work and turning out excellent cheese. The Board of Directors are: Peter Holland, John Galloway, Charles Robertson, Charles McCaffrey, Dick Harvey, and Alex. McDonald, secretary. The milk routes are: Route No. 1, Charles Robertson, Charlottetown; Route No. 2, P. J. Trammor, Fort Augustus; Route No. 3, William Hughes, Route No. 4, Donald Hughes, Bransford; Route No. 5, Price Thomas, Bransford. The Factory has capable men handling their milk. Rev. A. J. McDonald is a deeply interested patron. Between five and six thousand pounds of milk are received daily and between seven and eight on Monday.

Capt. M. McLeod, Vancouver, accompanied by his two daughters, is staying at the Victoria. Capt. McLeod arrived in this city some days ago and will spend about two months in this Province, which is a native. He formerly belonged to Holland and it is twenty years since he visited his homeland. He left the Province after the Prince Edward Island Bank became insolvent, by which he was one of the principal investors. He went out to Vancouver at that time, accompanied by his wife and one daughter, who is now with him on his visit here, and has remained in Vancouver since. Capt. McLeod has been a successful investor and has been in the number of years. He is among the number of energetic businessmen who, in far off lands, have had successful careers as officials in important departments and have returned home successful. Although his years are not few his bearing gives no indication of their being a burden to carry, for he is as vigorous and energetic as many who have not passed the forty year mark. Speaking of Vancouver, Captain McLeod says that it is an ideal location for business and referring to the changes in the city in the twenty years of his absence he seemed to think the greatest change was apparent in the people, nearly all those who were leaders in social, political and commercial life he found he did not know. The Province having passed away. He has a number of relatives in this city and in different parts of King's and Queen's Counties. His wife, at present in Vancouver, is a sister of A. G. Cogswell, Georgetown. He and the two Misses McLeod will spend a couple of months here before returning to his home.

Will you kindly call the attention of Cheese Factory Managers to the fact that quite a number of horses which have been forwarded for shipment this season have been so large as to project above the box in some cases as much as three inches. The covers are consequently pulled off and the cheese get crushed and damaged, considerably reducing their value. Also where cheese is not quite full size the box should be cut down to fit.
