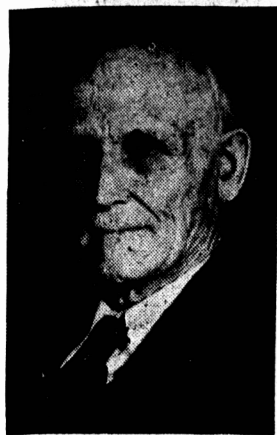

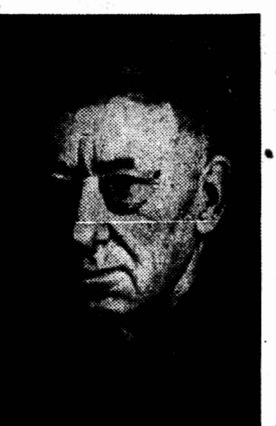

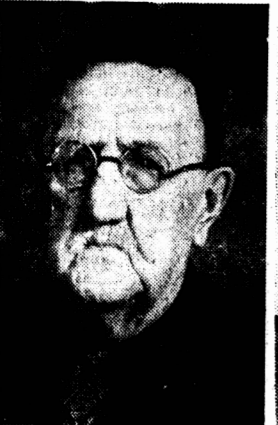

Legion Will Join S. A. Veterans In Parade Tomorrow

As reported yesterday, members of the Charlottetown branch of the Canadian Legion are joining the five surviving veterans of the South African war in a memorial parade to Trinity United Church tomorrow morning.

The Canadian contingent in South Africa was in command of Lieut. Col. W. D. Otter and was known as the 2nd Battalion (Special Reserve) Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry. It was 1,035 strong, divided into eight companies, each including one captain, three lieutenants and 121 noncommissioned officers and men.

Paardeberg

The battle of Paardeberg, which tomorrow's turnout commemorates, was fought on Feb. 27, 1900, G Company taking a particularly prominent part in this engagement, which resulted in surrender of the Boer General Cronje with 4,000 men.

Sticking To The Iron
