College Hockey Meeting Gives Acadia Game

TRURO, Feb. 4.—Representatives of the six maritime universities met here tonight to consider hockey matters. Mr. Allison's protests over the game played at Wolfville with Acadia was not allowed, the conference voting against it four to one. The game, stands, therefore, as a victory for Acadia. It was ordered that the tie game between St. Francis Xavier and Dalhousie should be replayed. Rough Stuff In National Hockey League

HAMILTON, Feb. 4.—In an editorial on Saturday night's hockey game between Tigers and Canadiens, the sporting editor of the Herald says: "If the National Hockey league does not take the bull by the horns and suspend its 'bad men', Hamilton's police will be asked to take action. "Is that the kind of hockey that Hamiltonians have to sit idly by and watch? If the N. H. L. thinks that local fans will sit still it is sadly mistaken. That sort of rowdism will not be tolerated here. Lalonde and Mummyry ought to be put out of professional hockey. Lalonde has done similar things before. Mummyry has 247 pounds of beef and very little more that entitles him to play in paid hockey. He slashes well and that seems to go a long way in professional company. "This morning manager Thompson wired President Calder of the N. H. L. urging that Lalonde and Mummyry be suspended. If no action is taken by the league head, the Hamilton police will take a hand and arrest the next player who makes a deliberate attack on local ice. Joe Malone and McDonald are clean hockey players and they play the game. It is a fine state of affairs when such fine types are slashed into unconsciousness by rowdism."
