THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., April 12.—The export trade in Canadian grain today was dull, there was some inquiry from the United Kingdom for Canadian western oats but as the prices bid were out of line with local exporters' views no real business was done. A firm feeling prevailed in the domestic market for cash grain and some further business was done in oats but the volume was not large. The undertone to the market for spring wheat grades of flour continued firm and a moderate amount of business was done. A stronger feeling prevailed in the winter wheat flour situation and although no actual change in prices was announced, the prospects were that they would be advanced in the very near future. There was an improved demand. Prices for all lines of millfeed were firmly maintained under a good demand from all sources. The receipts were 3,341 cases.

Victoria Hockey Club To Stage Concert Shortly

The Victoria Hockey Club will stage a Concert in the Strand Theatre on the 24th of April. This entertainment will be almost entirely of a musical nature. There will, however, be several readings interwoven in the programme. The best musical and vocal talent of the City will grace the occasion under the supervision of a local director. For lovers of music this event should furnish an evening of unadulterated pleasure. Our City is rich in Concert talent and indeed in histrionic ability such a golden field to garner in, the Victoria management have been assured by the director that all the numbers will be of exceptional merit and of the first class. The Vics closed their hockey season with a deficit, due mainly to the fact that intermediate hockey does not command the patronage which the senior hockey does, and at the same time the expenses are equally as high as those of a senior aggregation. The local club did hope to finish the season on a sound financial basis, but these rosy expectations were shattered when the league officials ordered the team to New Brunswick twice in successive weeks. The burden of financing the play offs fell entirely on the Vics. The receipts taken in were virtually nil. It is to wipe out this deficit, so incurred, that the Vics are asking the patronage of the citizens on April 24th. The Vics have furnished good clean sport in its two years of existence, and grabbed the honors consistently. The Club feels then, that they can confidently ask a measure of the support from Charlottetown, in continuing to supply a brand of good clean amateur sport. Little business was done in potatoes and the undertone to the market was easy but there was no further change in prices. The condition of the market for imported beans was unchanged, prices being firmly maintained under a fair demand. Owing to the steady increasing receipts of fresh made butter and the continued disappointing demand a weaker feeling developed in the market and prices declined 1-2 cent per pound. The jobbing prices were reduced 1 cent per pound to 40 cents per lb. for solid packages and to 41 cents per lb. for 1 lb. blocks. The receipts were 480 packages. The cheese trade was without any new feature to note the demand being purely of a local character. The receipts were 53 boxes.

Falling Tower Shakes Earth

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 12.—So great was the earth shock caused when a 60 foot stone tower on the old Abbot estate was felled that the seismograph instruments at Harvard Observatory recorded it. The crash of the mass of masonry shook the ground for a distance of a mile, and gave rise to reports of an earthquake. The tower, long a landmark, was torn down to make room for an apartment building.

But nothing has been heard of the matter since. It is to be hoped this good work will not be dropped.

BUDGET DEBATE

The Audits

Mr. Stewart next went on to compare the Hyndman-Shannon audit with the Poole-Scarth Audit. The Hyndman-Shannon audit was made at the right time. The present government made an audit up to August 1927. But they made it six months afterwards—when other entries were mixed in, and it would be almost impossible to make a correct audit. Mr. Stewart referred to the excellent experience of Mr. Shannon in the financial affairs of British Guiana. He is qualified from the standpoint of experience and non-partisanship to carry on an audit. Mr. Hyndman, too, is an auditor of long experience, who has carried an audit for the Liberals also.

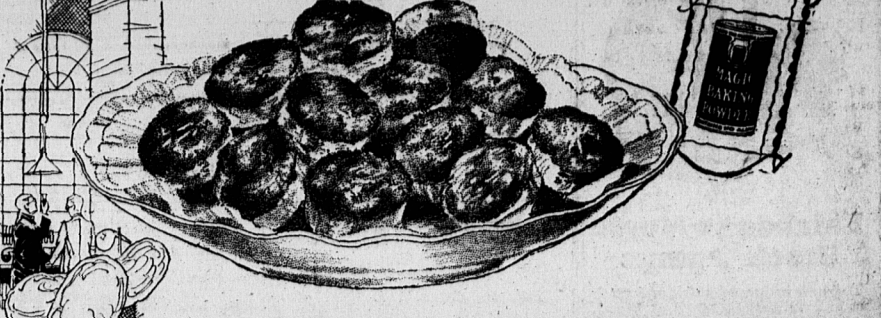
My Hon. friend on his own says, so states that Messrs. Hyndman and Shannon made a mistake when they say we left him a surplus of \$70,000.00. Who will the country believe? Messrs. Hyndman and Shannon, experienced auditors, or my Hon. friend. Nor should he say we spent \$7,000.00 to defeat him. We wouldn't try to defeat him for anything. Surely he is not angry at us for treating his district well? He accuses us of the opposition and the Guardian of sending delegations to annoy him. Well, that is absurd. No one sends delegations to any one to annoy him—unless he is very easily annoyed.

Mr. Stewart then went on to quote various statistics showing the borrowings made for highway improvement by the late government during their term of office. The total was \$480,000.00. He claimed that the audits showed that they had not increased the debt of the province. On August 12th the overdraft was \$1,500,000 on December 31st, \$363,000.00. This was on the Bank of Montreal and according to their own audit—in other words an increase of \$111,000.00. Mr. Stewart drew the conclusion from these and other figures that it was not the Conservatives who were responsible for the increase in the debt of the province during the past year. We have had a good deal of discussion as regards expenditure of the department of justice. The total expenditure for the year was \$44,000.00. By their own audit, all that we spent was \$11,000.00. The balance was spent by them to buy technical school. Much of the furniture is in the Provincial Building, and a good deal of the equipment is in the agricultural hall where it is employed by the short courses which are held there. (Here considerable cross firing took place between Mr. Lea and Mr. Stewart. Mr. Stewart said that arrangements had been made under the late government to conduct an agricultural course by cooperation between Prince of Wales College and the Dominion Experimental Farm. This was to have been done by the technical grant, which had been diverted to agriculture—surely a more important branch in this province. He went on to speak of the dismissal of an expert employed by the late government, who had given the people of this province valuable information in fruit growing. There was a splendid industry in the canning of blueberries, cranberries and such small fruits. He then went on to explain that any delay in the federal department's taking over the oyster grounds resulted from a dispute over the retention by the province of the right of the people to dig clams on the shores.

Public Welfare and Health

The one bright spot in my friend's address was the sympathy he had for these causes. He has great confidence in the help of the women in this matter. Perhaps it would be just as well for himself and for the province, if he left the government in the hands of the women. Mr. Stewart concluded his address with a general condemnation of the budget. Though he commended the Premier for his candour in frankly budgeting for a deficit, yet he felt sure the estimate in this matter would be greatly exceeded. He expressed his fear of the results of the policy of irresponsible borrowing which had been entered upon.
