Super-Tariff Against Canada

BERLIN, March 16—(Canadian Press Cable)—The official gazette today publishes a decree enforcing the so-called super-tariff against Canada effective April 1, on barley, fresh and canned fruit, fish, lobsters, turtles, butter, flour, paper, cardboard, aluminum, shoes, and certain kinds of machinery. There is no extra duty on Canadian wheat. The new tariff may be suspended

in six months on condition Canada enters negotiations with Germany forthwith for a commercial treaty. The decree authorizes the German Ministry of Finance to increase existing duties one hundred per cent or more. The same conditions in the decree apply to imports from Poland. Germany is one of the few countries in Central Europe with which Canada has never concluded a commercial treaty. Canada has had commercial treaties with France, Belgium, Holland, Spain, Czechoslovakia, Finland, Hungary, Estonia, the Serb, Croat and Slovene Kingdom, Roumania and Lithuania.
