- Bait, forty-eight pounds;
- Beans, sixty pounds;
- Beets, sixty pounds;
- Bituminous Coal, seventy pounds;
- Blue-grass seed, fourteen pounds;
- Buckwheat forty-eight pounds;
- Carrots, sixty pounds;
- Peas, sixty pounds;
- Potatoes, sixty pounds;
- Castor beans, forty pounds;
- Clover seed, sixty pounds;
- Flax seed, fifty-six pounds;
- Hemp seed, forty-four pounds;
- Indian corn, fifty-six pounds;
- Lime, seventy pounds;
- Malt, thirty-six pounds;
- Oats, thirty-four pounds;
- Onions, fifty pounds;
- Paranips, sixty pounds;
- Rye, fifty-six pounds;
- Timothy seed, forty-eight pounds;
- Turnips, sixty pounds;
- Wheat, sixty pounds;
