Cobb infantry was officially reported admitted to 2nd General Western Hospital, Manchester, England, Nov. 12th wounded and gassed. Pte. Cobb enlisted in Lethbridge in 1917 and went to France, August 9th, 1918.

THE CASCAPEDIA'S CARGO.—The cargo of the ill-fated Cascapedia was the greatest loss the trade has suffered for some time says a St. John's, Nfld. despatch. It was composed of sugar, cheese, dried fruits, hams, bacon, etc., and chocolates to the value of more than \$23,000. This was for the Christmas trade, and at this late season it is doubtful if the shippers will be able to duplicate their orders.

SERIOUSLY WOUNDED.—Word has been received that Gr. John McLean has been severely wounded in the leg. "Jack" enlisted August 10th 1916 with the 2nd Siege Battery from P. E. Island and was on active service two years and three months with only one leave of two weeks to England and ten days in Paris. While in France he made an inkwell out of a German shell also a paper cutter made of German material. Those two souvenirs and a German water bottle he sent to his children who reside with their grand parents at Peters Road, Lot 63.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mr. James Reach of Southport met with a very sudden death yesterday. He had brought a load of hogs to Davis & Fraser's factory in the forenoon and while backing his horse to have the hogs removed, he fell beneath the horses feet. He was carried into Inspector Bousfield's office where attempts were made to resuscitate but all to no avail. Two physicians were called in who after an examination pronounced death due to natural causes. Deceased had apparently been in good health when he left home that morning, though for a time he had been complaining of kidney trouble. He was 72 years of age and leaves to mourn a widow, four sons and three daughters.
