THE COOK'S CORNER

Cheese Ring Salad 1/2 cup Roquefort cheese 2 packages cream cheese (white) 1/4 cup milk 1 teaspoon Worcestershire 1/4 teaspoon paprika 1/2 teaspoon onion juice. 1 tablespoon gelatin 1/4 cup cold water 1 cup whipped cream Lettuce Chopped chicken, fruit or vegetables Dressing Mix Roquefort and cream cheese, milk and seasonings, working together until smooth. Add gelatin, soaked in cold water and dissolved over hot water. Fold in whipped cream, turn into a ring mould and place in refrigerator until firm.

Jellied Vegetable Salad 1 1/2 cups boiling water 1 package lemon gelatine 1 cup shredded cabbage 1 pimiento, chopped 1/2 cup chopped raw carrots 1 green pepper chopped 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire 4 tablespoons lemon juice, mayonnaise or other thick dressing. Pour boiling water on jelly powder and stir until clear. When cool, add thick as strained honey, fold in the chopped vegetables, salt, Worcestershire sauce and lemon juice. Pour into a mould. When firm, unmould and serve with dressing.
