RUMORS OF CABINET CHANGES AT OTTAWA.

There is some revival of the rumors of coming cabinet changes at Ottawa. One of the changes referred to is the possible retirement of Hon. A. B. Aylesworth from the department of Justice and from public life because of serious deafness. His ability, professional skill, knowledge and high character are on all hands admitted, and his retirement, should it occur, would be generally regretted as a public loss. The rumor regarding his early retirement has been several times about prematurely, and may be no better founded in this instance.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur's illness has been followed by a report that he, too, is about to retire, but this seems the more improbable, owing to the increased importance now attaching to the Marine Department by the creation of a Canadian navy. Rumor names Hon. Mr. Lemieux as his probable successor in the event of any change being made. Hon. Mr. Lemieux has very successfully conducted

the Post Office department, and proved himself an efficient and progressive departmental head.

We refer to these matters because there may be hope that in the event of changes there will be again some day a representation of this Province in the Cabinet. Should a new Minister of Justice be called for the name of Hon. Dr. Pugsley and of ex-Judge Warburton would naturally be suggested among others. The department of Marine has been twice held by Ministers from this Province—Hon. J. C. Pope and Sir Louis Davies. Hon. David Laird was Minister of the Interior in the Mackenzie Administration and the late Hon. B. Ferguson was a member of the Upper Ministry without portfolio.

The representation of the Maritime Provinces in the Cabinet cannot always be confined to delegates from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, whatever party may be in power.

A MOVE TO ABOLISH THE CANADIAN SENATE.

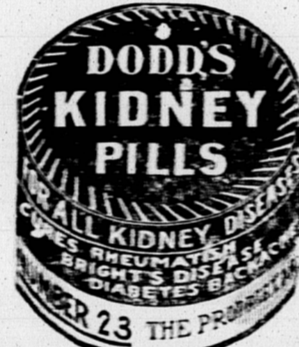
Mr. Lancaster, the Conservative member for Lunenburg, moved in the House of Commons the other day a resolution calling for the abolition of the Canadian Senate. His motion was supported by only twenty-three votes, while one hundred and eleven voted to retain the Upper Chamber. There were a good many absentees, but very probably had the members all been in their places the proposition of votes for and against would not have been materially different. The fact that Mr. Lancaster had his own reasons personal and public for desiring to get rid of the Senate is well known. He has promoted a bill in regard to railway crossings, which has two or three times passed through the Commons and was rejected by the Senate.

Only two Liberals were found voting with the minority for abolition. These were Hon. H. E. Emmerson of

Westmorland and H. H. Miller of South Grey, Ont. A much larger vote might be obtained for a well-considered measure for reform in the constitution of the Senate than for its abolition. When in power the Conservative party always strongly upheld the Senate, as they did also during the Mackenzie regime when the Upper House was mainly Conservative. But during Sir Wilfrid Laurier's long term of power things have changed. Various have frequently occurred in the course of nature among the old men, and these vacancies have been filled from the Liberal party, with the result that now the Conservatives in the Senate number but twenty in a full House of eighty-seven, or less than one fourth part of the whole. The Liberal majority in the Senate is now about forty-five with one or more vacancies to fill.

The transfer of the Dominion Atlantic Railway system to Messrs. McKinnon and Mann of the Canadian Northern marks an important stride forward in the latter enterprise company. The mileage transferred appears to be 125 miles, and brings the total mileage of the Canadian Northern to over 4,000 miles in operation.

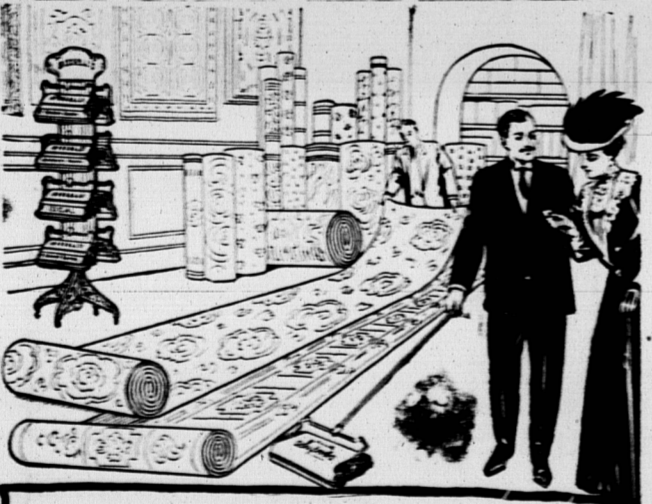
