AN EVENING WITH BLISS CARMEN.—The pupils of Prince Street school will have their authors evening on Friday, the 20th, instant, commencing at 8 o'clock.

EXPECTED HOME.—Mr. F. G. Jordan, of the Canada Fox Exchange and Investment Co., Ltd., who has been away on a business trip extending over two or three weeks, is expected to return home some time next week.

GOOD ACQUISITION.—Captain D. A. McKinnon, of the Canada Fox Exchange, has bought of Mr. R. A. Patterson, of Toronto, the bay mare Miss Alyone 2:24. This mare won two races at Montreal and one at Toronto, in the ice racing circuit this winter. She stepped one mile in 2:22. She will arrive today on the Minto.

NAME CHANGED.—The name of the Martin Silver Black Fox Company has been changed to that of "The Belfast Fox and Fur Farming Co., Ltd.," whose capital stock, as stated in the Royal Gazette of Saturday last, will be thirty-eight thousand dollars divided into seven hundred and sixty shares of fifty dollars each. The company will have its office at Kinross.

SEED FAIR MEETING.—A meeting of the Central Seed Fair Committee was held in the Agricultural Hall on Friday the 13th. In the absence of the President, Rev. P. D. McGuigan, the Vice-President, Mr. Simpson occupied the Chair. The committee appointed to revise the Prize List reported that no change had been made. After some discussion it was decided that it would not be advisable to hold the Horse Show in conjunction with the Seed Fair. It was agreed that the Household Science Exhibition be held as usual in connection with the Seed Fair. It is understood that the Seed Fair will be held this year as follows: Provincial Seed Fair at Summerside, March 3, 4 and 5 King's County at Georgetown, March 9th; Central at Charlottetown March 10, 11 and 12. The Southern Seed Fair on February 25th and the Souris Seed Fair on February the 27th.

THE TRAINS.—The storm of Saturday night was the means of blocking the Railway line of the P. E. I., especially the western end, making it considerably difficult for trains to get through to their destinations. The trains which left Charlottetown at 2 o'clock Saturday stuck hard and fast in a snow bank one and a half miles east of O'Leary and stayed there for the night. She was also stalled in the same place over Sunday. The fight was taken up again on Monday morning and at 1 o'clock Monday she was making her way along slowly to Tignish. The line is blocked between Bloomfield and Tignish, the snow on the Railway line, being a depth of from 8 to 10 feet. The train for Summerside which left Charlottetown at 7:15 Monday morning got stuck in the snow at Kelvin Station. The trains from east and from Murray Harbor got into Charlottetown Monday morning as usual with but little difficulty.

ICE RACING.—The Ice Racing Association are marking time until the weather changes. Under present conditions it would be impossible to hold any further races, as a good thaw is absolutely necessary. However, it is the opinion that with the splendid body of ice already formed it will be possible to carry the racing programme well into the middle of March, so that there will be plenty of time left for racing.

SPECIAL SHOOTING PRIZES.—Word has been received from Ottawa that the Militia Council, having in view the greater encouragement of rifle shooting among members of civilian rifle associations, has decided to offer as a special prize a nickel silver, bearing the coat-of-arms of the Dominion. To be eligible for the prize it will be necessary for the Association to hold four competitions during 1914, in which at least 40 per cent. of the members must take part. The range will be at 200, 500, and 600 yards.

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS.—This is to be a big week in K. P. Circles. The golden Jubilee of the founding of the order will be celebrated in Washington, D. C., where the Order was first held fifty years ago, commencing Thursday and continuing for three days. Mr. C. Leonard McKay, Charlottetown Grand Chancellor of the Maritime Provinces' Domain, and who is prevented from being present on account of business—this being the close of the firm's financial year—has delegated Mr. Frank H. Gadsue of Union Lodge No. 2, St. John to represent the Maritime Provinces. There will be a local celebration here on the Thursday evening when the brethren of Empire Lodge, No. 19 will hold special ritualistic ceremony commemorative of the founding of the order, at which a musical and literary program will be carried out followed by refreshments.

"OLDER BOYS" CONFERENCE.—The nucleus of a committee to have charge of arrangements for the "Older Boys" Conference to be held in March, 27-29, met in the Y.M.C.A. rooms last evening. Those present were Messrs. J. H. Clark, F. W. Steele, E. T. Higgins, Dr. J. H. Ayres, J. P. Gordon, M. R. Bethune, G. E. Full and Professor Steele. After some discussion of the work which the Conference will probably accomplish, methods of reaching every Sunday school in the province were considered. It was decided to invite delegates from the Anglican Sunday schools to attend the Conference. The following sub-committees were proposed, members of which will be appointed before the next meeting of the general committee: Publicity, Billings, Finance, Reception, Banquet and Music. The next meeting of the committee will be held on Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock and it is hoped that there will be a much larger attendance. Mr. J. H. Clark was elected Chairman last evening, when he presided.

FOX NEWS.—Last week a party of four American gentlemen was in the city buying options for the purpose of starting a large company. This is only one of many American companies, which have been projected for 1914. Options of 1914 foxes are in excellent demand, consequent on the formation of new companies at home and abroad. The latest London sales, Report shows a fifty per cent. advance in silver and a similar advance in cross foxes. The Hudson's Bay report has not yet been received, but it is believed, that they are obtaining for their Peace River stock are very much higher than any in the history of the company.—A great number of enquiries have been received from the Eastern states, especially from Maine, in regard to cross foxes, and it would not be surprising if the demand from these parts for this fox next year were larger than the supply, as owing to the increased value of the fur, and the possibilities of securing blacks from crosses the proposition looks very attractive. The prices of silver black foxes in the West has advanced from six to ten thousand dollars per pair for good quality, wild fox stock.—The Government has prohibited the exportation of female silver blacks.—Several large companies have been formed to establish ranches on a big scale, and one concerns proposes to start with twenty pairs of Island and twenty pairs of Western foxes. The capital is being supplied from Great Britain.
