**BEER AT PICNICS.**

The matter of intoxicating beer supplied at picnics, excursions and sometimes at tea parties has been brought to the attention of The Guardian. "Table beer," and alleged non-intoxicating drinks, but containing a considerable percentage of alcohol, have from the first been much dealt in by illegal dealers. By this means they have been frequently able to make considerable sales and still escape prosecution.

It is a feature of the rum traffic that it has a thousand treacherous arts to practice on the minds of men. Sometimes worthy promoters of church or Sunday school picnics have been gravely deceived in this matter, by permitting so-called "table beer" to be supplied at refreshment booths on the ground where the party partake of refreshments. Too frequently, because of this scenes of drunkenness and disorder have resulted, bringing scandal in their train. Cases have been related to us in which young men and boys obtained their first taste of intoxicating drinks at the refreshment booth of a church picnic. For this reason the picnic, excursion or tea party at which so-called "temperate beer" is dispensed has come into disrepute with a large portion of the community and rightly so.

We are glad to know that a number of our clergymen both Protestant and Catholic have set their faces resolutely against the "table beer" nuisance and will not tolerate it at all in places and at times where their congregations meet for social intercourse and enjoyment. We trust others will follow the good example so that the so-called "non-intoxicating" stuff, which the toppers and drinkers all so eagerly seek after at picnics, (in case nothing stronger can be had) may be

hereafter entirely excluded. It is high time that the "temperate beer" nuisance was exposed and suppressed, if necessary by the strong arm of the law. Not very long ago a Prosecutor under the Scott Act interred and warned a party who had a supply of table beer for sale at a picnic, that if the stuff was sold he would be prosecuted. It was accordingly removed from the grounds.

The Legislative machinery of Cape Colony is to be set in motion again after its long suspension. Premier Sir Gordon Sprigg had been very anxious upon this matter and gained the support of the other Colonial Premiers now in London. The Imperial Government appears to have agreed to this with some hesitancy, owing to the troubled state of the Colony during the war, and the fact that a majority of the population are of the Dutch race, many of whom had carried their sympathy for their Beer compatriots to the length of actual rebellion. But better feelings are now in the ascendant, and as the actual rebels are to be hereafter disfranchised it is deemed safe and desirable to restore constitutional representative government.

The limited number of visitors who saw the Maritime Medical Association in session in the Legislative Chamber, with Dr. Taylor presiding in the Speaker's chair were much impressed with their distinguished appearance and bearing. Never before had proceedings in the Chamber been conducted with more order, decorum and dignity, or did members treat each other with more courtesy or bear themselves with greater self-respect. The ruling of the Chair was always prompt, concise and just, as of a Speaker who knew his ground, and it was always implicitly obeyed. Some members of the Legislature might have learned profitable lessons both in deportment and debate by attending the meeting of the Medicos in the Legislative Hall.

The London Canadian Gazette has given several intimations that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's health is not all that could be desired. It will be learned with regret by the people of Canada in general, and yet it is by no means surprising, Sir Wilfrid has never been a very robust man and in his youth he was accounted very delicate. For a long time past, and notably during the past six or seven years he has been subjected to great and constant strain that might have taxed the strongest constitution. He is now engaged in matters of grave imperial concern in London. A diplomatic mission to Paris and a visit to Rome have been spoken of as likely to follow. When is the Premier to have the greatly needed rest? He is no longer a young man, and it is important both to himself and to Canada that his powers of endurance should not be taxed to a break-down. He surely needs a vacation, although it may be harder for him to get it than for almost any other man in Canada.

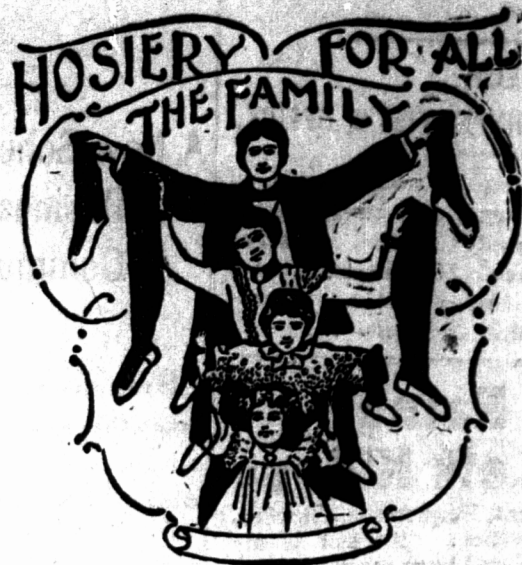

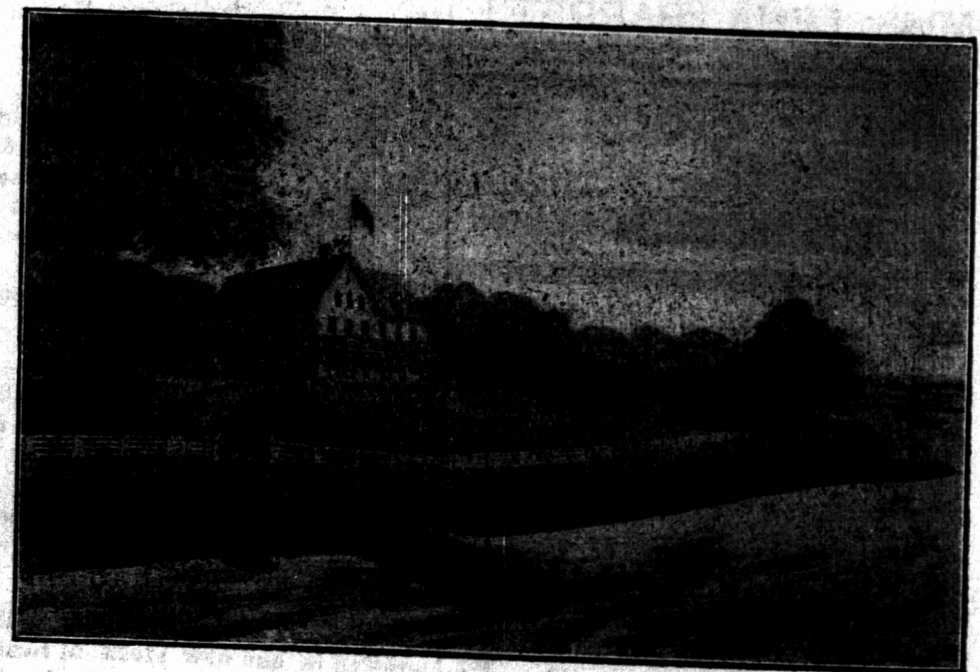
