PRINCE LOUIS AND HIS FLEET

Canada has reason to feel proud of her latest naval visitors, Prince Louis of Battenberg and his cruiser squadron of the British navy.

Everyone is familiar with Rear-Admiral Percy Scott, the great gunnery expert of the British fleet, and it may serve to indicate what manner of naval officer Prince Louis of Battenberg is if it is stated that he and Percy Scott were shipmates at sea together in their younger days and were associated in inventing an ingenious signaling code. At this time both of these officers were serving in the Inconstant, which took a prominent part in the bombardment of Alexandria in 1882. From his earliest years Prince Louis has been popular with officers and men alike, and his capacity is as great as his charm of manner. He is "keen on his job," to employ a naval phrase.

The grandson of Louis II., Grand Duke of Hesse, was a great favorite of Queen Victoria and as a boy, with his brother, the late Prince Henry, came over to England as her Majesty's protegee. He became a naturalized British subject and entered the navy when between 13 and 14 years of age as a naval cadet, his brother joining the army. From the first Prince Louis showed his great capacity and real enthusiasm for his profession. He has always been treated as an ordinary officer, and it is a common saying in naval circles that if he had not been born a prince his energy, ability and resourcefulness would have been more readily recognized. In command of the patrolling gun battery of the naval brigade which occupied Alexandria 21 years ago, he did good work. This has been his only war service owing to those changes or mischances which sometimes rob men of opportunities of showing real brilliance.

RAN THE BLOCKADE

As commander and as captain, Prince Louis has revealed great powers of management of men, which is one of the finest of the successful naval officer, and his ships have always been what sailors call "happy ships," vessels in which officers and men pulled well together. As a fleet commander he got a chance of showing his tactical ability owing to the death, in very sad circumstances, of Rear-Admiral Burgess Watson, then a divisional commander in the Mediterranean, on the eve of an important maneuver, about three years ago. These exercises could not be postponed, so Prince Louis, who was then in command of the battleship Implacable, of 15,000 tons displacement, and senior post captain on the station, was directed to hoist the broad pennant as a commodore and take Admiral Watson's place. It was his lot to be blockaded at Argostoli by an immensely superior fleet. Could he escape? That was the problem. By a strategical, simple in the extreme and yet singularly successful, he evaded all the blockading ships and got clean away.

This escape was a brilliant performance and it was at once realized that the fleet had got another first-rate man to hoist his flag in time of war. He remained in the Mediterranean only a month or two longer and then came the news of his appointment to the important and most responsible post of a director of naval intelligence at the Admiralty. On the morning that the announcement was made, the Times published a most eulogistic leader on Prince Louis and his work, and the King cabled to Prince Louis, then at Malta, congratulating him on the fact that the nation was beginning to recognize his ability, and that the long years of devotion to his profession were bearing fruit.

In November, 1902, he took over his new duties at the Admiralty and was still filling his appointment when the war in the far east and the Dogger Bank incident occurred. These were anxious times, because, not only had the British fleet to be always ready for an emergency, but Prince Louis had to be able to put his finger at a moment's notice on every foreign man-of-war so as to be able to regulate the distribution of the British fleet. The Prince at the critical time amply justified the trust imposed in him, and won golden opinions on all hands, not least among his admirers being Mr. Balfour himself. His success was a special source of pleasure to the King, who had always had faith in the husband of his sister's child. Prince Louis married, it may be recalled, Princess Victoria, daughter of Princess Alice and Louis IV., Grand Duke of Hesse.

HOISTED THE FLAG.

As soon as affairs were propitious in Europe and the far east, Prince Louis asked to be allowed to hoist his flag, for he had been promoted by seniority, and not selection to rear-admiral in September 1904. He had done a good deal of work in various capacities ashore, and he wanted to get back to his element, the sea. Consequently he was offered and accepted the command of the second cruiser squadron, and early this year hoisted his maiden flag. It is characteristic of this royal admiral that one of his first acts was to have all the gun equipment on his flagship Drake thoroughly tested, and he had a number of changes made on board the vessel in accordance with his own ideas as to war fitness, for he is something of an inventor, and has views of his own. It has been his misfortune to be a prince, but whatever prejudice there was once against him on this account, he seems now to have completely disarmed by his personal service to the country of his adoption, his charming manners and his proved ability as a fleet commander. He is one of the handsomest officers in the British fleet, tall and imposing, with a close cut beard and moustache, and an upright and most courtier-like bearing. Of course, he has benefited materially by royal influences in his early promotions, but whatever favoritism has been shown has been fully justified in the result, and the navy has no more capable or popular flag officer. German by birth, he is now British through and through.
