DREADNAUGHT IS A LEVIATHAN

Britain's Latest and Greatest Battleship Will Cost \$10,000,000.

LONDON, Sept. 25.—That modern naval battles are decided by big ships and big guns appears to be the view held by the British Government.

The Shipping World says: "In the Dreadnaught the Admiralty appears to have anticipated the lessons taught by the battle in the Tsubima Straits. She will be able to deliver a smashing fire at long range; the power is put down at 23,000 horse power, and should be sufficient, for from twenty to twenty-one knots. A close estimate is not possible, for the dimensions, are not stated and the length and fineness, two important factors, cannot therefore be brought into the calculation.

"The 12 inch guns, will, in all probability, be arranged in pairs, and according to a scale of drawings in the Naval Annual, there has been a considerable reduction in the diameters of the barbettes of 12 inch gun mountings.

"In the King Edward VII these appear to be about thirty-four feet in diameter, while in the Lord Nelson they show only about twenty-five feet diameter.

"With that reduction the economy in the weight of the armor will be considerable when the barbettes have to be constructed, the completion and erection of these guns and mountings in the time named.

"She is to be launched in four months, and commissioned in sixteen months. "This will be phenomenal, and we should not be surprised if the completion of the ship will depend on the efforts of the contractors for the guns and gun mountings.

"There is also machinery of the turbine type to be designed, built, put on board and tried.

"The building of the ship at such a rate would be an achievement if she were of the ordinary type, but when so many novel features are embodied it will prove a piece of work that will reflect the highest credit on the Admiralty officials, dockyard officers and contractors for the manufacture of the machinery and gunmountings."

The displacement of the Dreadnaught is reported at 18,000 tons and she will be proportionately more expensive than the King Edward VII., of 16,800 tons.

That ship was put down in the Navy Estimates as costing £1,500,000, so that the Dreadnaught, when commissioned,

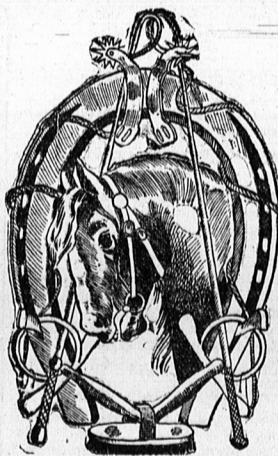
