STUBBORN FIGHT IN THIBET PASS

The British Expedition Forces a Passage.

En Route to Lhasa—St. John Ship Burned—Missouri Democrats Adopt a Reform Platform.

FIGHTING IN THIBET. YANGTSE, July 21—(Special)—The British mission to Thibet July 18 forced the passage of ice-clad Karols, the highest pass on the road.

A stubborn resistance was made. The British are now ninety-two miles from Lhasa.

ST. JOHN SHIP BURNED. NEW YORK, July 21—(Special)—The St. John ship Creedmore, naphtha laden, for Liverpool was burned off Woods Hall Mass.

ACTION BEGUN FOR DAMAGES

Of \$1000 in a Breach of Promise Case

The Plaintiff Says Her Feelings and Her Prospects Have Been Injured—Defendant Now Married.

The next session of the Supreme Court promises to furnish an interesting breach of promise suit if the proceedings which have been commenced are carried to a conclusion.

A billable writ has been issued by Mary Alberta Carver of Pownal against William Aorn of the same place asking damages of \$1000 for breach of promise.

The defendant was arrested by Sheriff McDougall and afterwards admitted by Chief Justice Sullivan to \$400 bail. Aorn is a married man of several weeks duration and the plaintiff is a young lady to whom he formerly paid attention.

The lengthy affidavit in connection sets forth that three years ago the defendant began keeping company with the plaintiff and continued his attentions up till April last. During that period, Miss Carver had gone abroad but her absence did not cause a break in the course of what appeared to be true love.

She returned and a date was set in April last for the wedding but the day before the ceremony the plaintiff, it is alleged, disappeared and eventually reached Boston. There he met a young lady named McDonald and some weeks ago their marriage took place.

It is also alleged in the affidavit that while plaintiff was in Boston defendant wrote her two letters, while she was home he called at least once a week in winter and three times a week in summer. In the kitchen of George Carver's house in Pownal on April 4, 1903 Aorn asked her to marry him and she consented. She said she would be married in a year's time but the next September was finally agreed upon. They went driving in winter and rowing in summer and spent much time together. On Thursday, April 7th last a promise was made in the home of Aorn by him to marry plaintiff on April 13. He promised to call the day before that date to complete arrangements but he did not come. On April 13 plaintiff was told by her father

BRITISH VESSEL WAS TORPEDOED

Accidentally, so Russian Commander Reports—Russia Will Probably Release the Seized Mail Steamer Malacca—Chefoo Has Another Story of Serious Japanese Reverse Before Port Arthur.

MR. FITZPATRICK DENIES. OTTAWA, July 21—(Special)—Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick has declared there is absolutely no truth in the story that he is to become solicitor for the Grand Trunk Pacific.

TORPEDOED BRITISH STEAMER. TIEN TAI, July 21—(Special)—The commander of a Russian torpedo boat reported having accidentally torpedoed a British steamer in the Gulf of Pechili. It is believed it was the Hip Steak, now five days overdue.

MALACCA TO BE RELEASED. LONDON, July 21—(Special)—It is understood that Russia will release the steamer Malacca on Britain giving an assurance that the stores on board were British Government stores.

At the same time Russia will maintain the legality of the status of her volunteer fleet.

ANOTHER CHEFOOLERY. CHEFOO, July 21—(Special)—A French priest living here has received information that the Japanese suffered a severe

loss north of Port Arthur recently and were driven back to Nago Pass. [The report by a Russian torpedo boat commander that he had accidentally destroyed a British steamer wears a suspicious aspect, to say the least, in view of present Russian hostility to everything British. The release of the mail steamer Malacca if made will be practically under diplomatic compulsion, and will probably have the effect of producing more caution on the part of commanders of the Russian volunteer fleet in the future. The report of another Japanese reverse before Port Arthur comes from Chefoo, which has hitherto been the most fruitful source of misinformation in regard to the war. The statement that it comes through a French priest is intended to add to the credibility of the report, but that is, probably only an after thought.]
