FRANCE WAITS RUHR REPORT LONDON, Jan 16—According to special despatches from Essen, representatives of the 12 Ruhr industries, including the Krupp, Stinnes and Thyssen groups have been summoned to attend a meeting at the Dusseldorf town hall at 3 o'clock this afternoon to meet General Degoutte and the Belgian command. It is added that they will be asked finally whether they will co-operate with the French or German here to the orders of the delivery controller, forbidding the return of coal and coke, even in return for cash payments and France's action will depend on their answer.

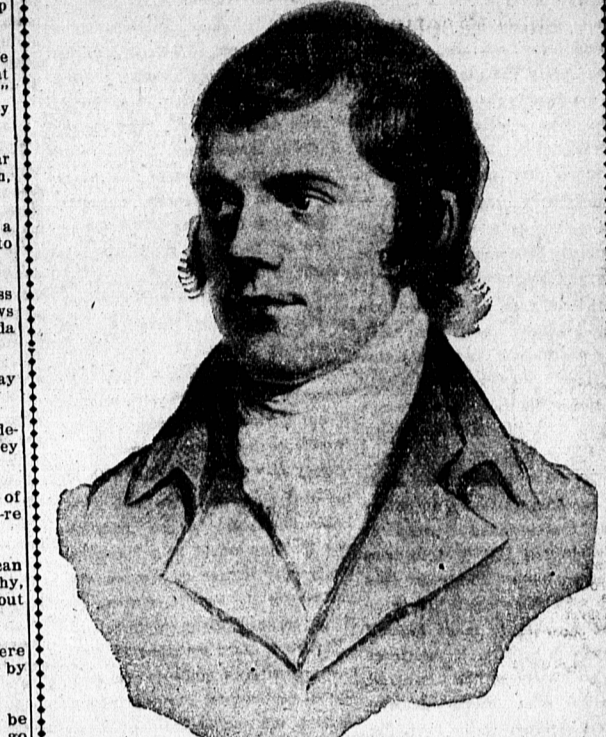
