Hearty Support

OTTAWA, October 10.—The speech
 of Premier R. B. Bennett, in which
 he outlined to the Imperial Confer-
 ence his proposals for developing
 Empire trade finds hearty support
 among his cabinet colleagues here. At
 the conclusion of the cabinet meet-
 ing, Sir George Perley, acting Prime
 Minister, expressed satisfaction with
 the proposals. "We are all proud of
 our Prime Minister," he told the
 Canadian Press.

The speech has aroused great in-
 terest in Ottawa and considerable con-
 jecture as to future developments.
 Should Mr. Bennett's proposals be
 accepted, the plans for the coming
 session of the Dominion Parliament
 would doubtless undergo extensive

NOT SIGHTED IN IRELAND
 Before confirmation of the fact
 that the Columbia had come down
 was received, the last previous re-
 port had showed her in the Atlantic
 shipping lane about 200 miles off
 Lend's End. Boyd and Connor were
 not sighted anywhere in Ireland
 though civic guards had been told to
 keep on the watch for them. Ap-
 parently their course took them well
 to the south of the Free State.

Levine at Crocyden
 Information that the sturdy mono-
 plane's second crossing was at an
 end, was received with relief by a
 small crowd that had gathered at
 Crocyden Airfield to welcome the
 aviators after their dangerous jour-
 ney. Among these at the field were
 Charles A. Levine, who came over
 from Paris by aeroplane to greet the
 aviators and members of the Cana-
 dian and United States Colonies in
 London.

Little off Course
 Lieut. Conors, reputed to be an ex-
 cellent navigator, failed to hit the
 nail on the head as he did on the
 Columbia's flight from New York to
 Bermuda some months ago. He was
 more than 150 miles off the course
 from Newfoundland to Crocyden. Tre-
 sco is roughly 200 miles by airline
 from Crocyden, which lies slightly
 south of London.

HOSPITAL CAMPAIGN MEETINGS

District meeting in three different
 towns last night in the campaign to
 raise \$250,000 to complete the con-
 struction and equipment fund for
 the new Prince Edward Island Hos-
 pital showed that the people of the
 Province are taking a keen interest
 in the fund raising movement, and
 will do their part toward making it
 a signal success. The meetings were
 held in Bonshaw, Murray Harbor
 and Kingsboro.

Miss Mona Wilson, of the Red
 Cross, and Dr. R.F. Seaman, of the
 Hospital Staff were the speakers at
 Bonshaw. Miss Wilson told a large
 audience how clearly her Red Cross
 work had taught her the urgent need
 of a new building for the Prince
 Edward Island Hospital. She said
 many children sent to the Hospital
 by the Red Cross often had to wait
 for weeks to obtain beds in the in-
 stitution. Dr. Seaman sketched the
 growth of the Hospital and pointed
 out its many needs. The enter-
 tainment program included a solo
 by Mrs. J.A. Lawson, a duet by Mrs.
 Lawson and Miss Lillian McKenzie,
 Mrs. Keith Rogers was the accom-
 panist. Mr. J.J. McLeod, at the
 conclusion of the meeting made a
 stirring speech pledging the support
 of the people of Bonshaw.

At a large meeting in Murray Har-
 bor splendid addresses were made
 by Mr. W.K. Rogers, Chairman of the
 Memorial Committee, and the
 Rev. H.D. Raymond, M.A., setting
 forth the Hospital's appeal. Entertain-
 ers from Charlottetown included
 Mrs. J.A.C. Rodgers, Chairman of
 the Entertainment Committee,
 accompanist, Mrs. R.E. Mutch, read-
 ing, Miss Pearl Burns and Mr. Mal-
 colm McKinnon, solos.
