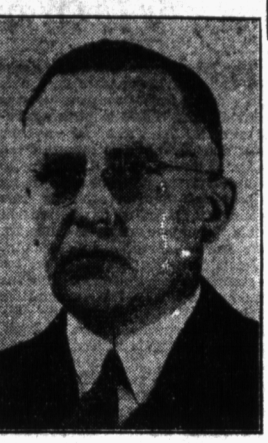

RECOMMENDATIONS of the MARITIME FERTILIZER COUNCIL

We are pleased to announce that the fertilizer companies have agreed to adopt the recommendation of the Maritime Fertilizer Council to reduce the number of brands, offered for sale in the Maritimes, from 21 to the following 10:

- FORMULAE RECOMMENDED FOR 1-10-4 Grain, or turnips with manure. 1-12-6 Grain seeded to hay or clovers; turnips, etc. 1-10-5 Gardens or grain on soils low in nitrogen. 4-8-7 (1934 only) Gardens; pastures; potatoes; hoed crops, etc. 1-8-8 Gardens; pastures; potatoes; etc. (Same as 4-8-7 concentrated.) 4-6-10, 4-8-10, 4-8-13, 5-8-12, all with or without magnesium. Potatoes; mangels and hoed crops on light soils. 1-5-7 Light areas.

Rates per acre will vary according to soil conditions and amounts of manure used. The following recommendations are approximate: For Grain 400 to 600 lbs.; For Turnips 500 to 1200 lbs.; For Potatoes and Mangels 1200 to 2000 lbs.

If you are using ready-mixed fertilizers it is in your interest to request from your agent or dealer only those for which the increased demand for potash is especially true. This is especially true if you are mixing at home corresponding amounts of Nitrogen, Phosphate and Potash should give satisfactory results.

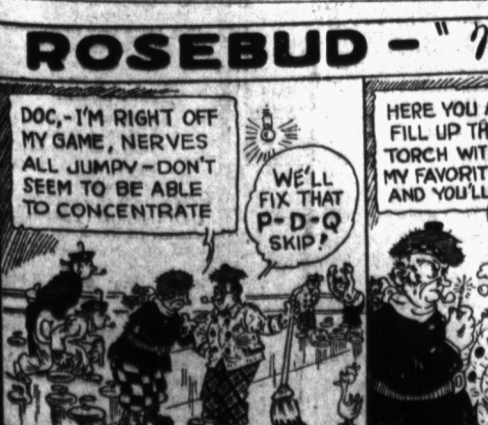

The Cutting of Seed Potatoes

In the course of a few weeks every potato grower will once more be engaged at his annual task of cutting potatoes for seed, and, owing to the gradual improvement of conditions in general, and especially the increased demand for potash during recent months it is reasonable to expect that the average grower will have perhaps more seed to cut than he has had in the past. As to the time of cutting seed, the majority of small growers cut just before planting. But in the case of large growers some of the seed is cut several weeks in advance. As to which practice should follow is often a matter of circumstances. There is, of course, a possibility of the seed being cut too long to be planted, and to produce a poor quality of seed. Here we say it is especially true if the temperature in which the seed is kept is high. Otherwise, the seed will give equally as good results as newly cut seed. A profitable practice is the greening or sprouting of seed before planting. This may be done by spreading the potatoes out in thin layers where they will be exposed to some light. The floor of a barn provided with windows is quite satisfactory. Some growers simply spread them on the ground and shade them well. It is not advisable to have tubers exposed to the direct rays of the sun as this may set up conditions favourable for the development of black heart. When tubers are thus spread out for two or three weeks, there will be produced a number of thick, stocky, green sprouts at each stem-end eye. The sprouts of such seed have a much better chance of appearing above ground and establishing their roots, and thus producing a better stand than if the tuber had developed spindle-like sprouts. This or any other practice tending to hasten the appearance of the sprouts after the seed is planted has been found beneficial towards increasing the percentage of stand in the field. This is due mainly to the lesser possibility of the seed decaying and the formation of
