Mrs Margaret L. Shepherd Takes the Stage.

The difficult task of reclaiming the wicked theatrical profession has been entrusted to the hands of no less a personage than Margaret L. Shepherd, a woman of whom you may have heard.

A RICH AND RACY PLAY.

In two weeks this new aspirant for histrionic honors will appear in a new play mainly by herself entitled "Fired as by Fire." The play will constitute the story of the authoress' life pretty much as it is told in her book.

The play has been in rehearsal for some time and Mrs. Shepherd has gathered together a company of capable players who are now engaged in a suite of rooms at Forum hall, Yonge street, mastering the details of the drama.

MRS. SHEPHERD HER OWN STAR.

Of course Mrs. Shepherd will take the leading role, her principal support being Mr. Martin Cleworth and Mrs. Cleworth, well known in dramatic circles in this city.

The story of the play will begin with the heroine as a little girl and will follow the stirring scenes of her life with, it is said, extremely realistic stage pictures. The company will give the initial performance in Canada and then will cross the line.

It is said that engagements are in great demand, by managers and that all dates are filled up for three months ahead.

A Star reporter saw Mrs. Shepherd this morning at her temporary headquarters in the Forum Building.

She refused to say what specialties would be produced in the course of the play or even that there would be any play.

"For six years I have been subjected to a continual strain, and it has told on me very much. My physicians say that a change will do me good, so I have determined to produce the story of my life in dramatic form."

The Victims of the Fire.

WILL BE PROVIDED FOR BY THE STATE, AND THE BURNED FORESTS MADE FARM.

DULUTH, Minn., Sept. 11.—Governor Nelson, a member of the State Commission, and Mayor Eustis, of Minneapolis, arrived last night, and held a meeting with the Local Committee men.

The matter of permanently providing for the refugees was discussed. The owners of the burned mills will be asked if they will re-build, and if not, it is designed to make agricultural country of the burned territory. Two representatives of the Land Department of St. Paul and Duluth road were present, and offered to give farms free to all heads of families who do not own their farms.

All heads of families will be sent down as soon as possible, and will be furnished with timber for temporary homes, their families in the meantime being provided for here or wherever they are.

Speech Restored by Shock.

WINFIELD, L. I., Sept. 11.—Mary Fisher, thirteen years old, whose home is in New York and who has been deaf and dumb for eight years, recovered speech and hearing last evening, after having been stunned by lightning. She had had an unusually severe attack of malaria when she five years old, and when she recovered speech and hearing were gone.

A Soldier's "Bike" Record.

LIEUTENANT DONOVAN MAKES 600 MILES IN FIVE AND A HALF DAYS.

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 11.—Covered with mud and worn out with the fatigues incident to a 607-mile journey on a bicycle, Lieutenant Donovan of the Seventeenth Infantry, stationed at Fort Russell, arrived in this city last evening, having left Cheyenne at 6 o'clock Monday morning.

He made the trip for the purpose of demonstrating to the War Department the efficiency of the wheel on a long march. He had his wheel rigged for the purpose of carrying the usual equipments of a soldier in the field. He consumed 8 1/2 days of actual travelling time. He expected to arrive Saturday, but bad roads prevented. General Brook was pleased with the demonstration, and will recommend it to the War Department.

General Conference.

NO CHANGE THE NAME OF THE CHURCH—RECEPTION OF FRATERNAL DELEGATES—MARITIME COMMITTEE MEN.

LONDON, Oct., Sept. 11.—The general conference sat from 9 this morning till noon. A number of memorials and notices of motion were presented, including a memorial from the members of the Toronto conference for admission of women to the ministry, a notice of motion from a member of the Manitoba conference to change the name of the church to the Methodist church of Canada. The committee sat from two till four, when the conference reassembled and twenty odd notices of motion respecting changes in discipline were presented.

Rev. Dr. Porter, delegate of the African Methodist Episcopal, presented and read a well written address from his church, which was well received. The evening session was devoted to the reception of fraternal delegations. Rev. Henry Pope, from the British Wesleyan conference and Methodist church in Ireland, was the first received, and after the reading of formal addresses conveyed by him he addressed the conference. His address was an eloquent and powerful exposition and vindication of the history and present position of English Methodism.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—There was no session of the conference today. Nine committees sat during the forenoon, seven during the afternoon and eight during the evening. The committee on the course of study has decided to recommend raising the standard of the education of probationers for the ministry. The conference will be asked to legislate requiring candidates for probation to pass university matriculation examinations, except under special circumstances. The committee on sustentation fund almost unanimously decided to recommend that each conference shall maintain and control a sustentation fund. The missionary committee favors the reduction of the number of members of the mission board about one third. The committee on book and publishing interest unanimously recommend the reduction of the Guardian to \$1.

AN ABRUPT ENDING

Larkin-Connolly Trial is Finished.

Funeral of the Count of Paris—Another Civil War May Come in Hayti.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE GUARDIAN.)

QUEBEC, Sept. 12.—The cases against Larkin and Connolly came to an abrupt ending today. They were being sued for upwards of \$750,000 in the Exchequer Court, but the Government withdraws all charges of wrong doing on payment of \$45,000.

Civil War Expected.

PORT AU PRINCE, Sept. 12.—Great excitement prevails here and a bloody civil war is expected on the death of President Hippolyte who is dangerously ill with heart trouble.

Funeral of the Count of Paris.

WEYBRIDGE, Sept. 12.—After private mass at Stowe House the body of the pretender was brought here and placed in a vault near the altar. Cardinal Vaughan officiated. Most of the European Monarchs were represented.

A Swede's Perilous Voyage.

QUEENSTOWN, Sept. 12.—Capt. A. F. Reisch, a Swede, who left New York August 5th in the schooner "rigged skin Nina," arrived today. The boat was damaged and leaking but he was sailing alone.

Racing at London.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—The St. Leger stakes were won today by "Throstle" with Ladass second and Matchbox third.

A Canadian Moonshiner.

AN ILLICIT WHISKEY STILL FOUND ON A QUEBEC FARM.

OTTAWA, Sept. 11.—Twenty-five miles back of Buckingham, near the Lierre River, is the farm of Maxime Lanson. Maxime was considerably surprised last Thursday when a police party made its descent upon his place.

A hundred-gallon still was found on the farm. It had not been in operation for some weeks. It measured five feet high, eight feet round and two feet eight inches in diameter.

A very ingenious plan had been adopted by the moonshiners in regard to the smaller still. It was situated twenty feet under ground-level, at the base of an enormous tree. Shrubbery had been trained to cover the opening, to the casual observer. A roaring fire would be built below the apparatus, and the smoke was skillfully concealed. This plan, however, was exceedingly dangerous, as the flames might at any time have spread through the district, leaving another Minnesota forest fire story to be told. Maxime was taken into custody.
