MRS. ISABELLE ANN HOOD.

On September thirteenth, nineteen hundred and sixteen, the spirit of Mrs. Isabelle Ann Hood, Tryon, passed peacefully to Him who gave it. Born January first, eighteen forty two, Mrs. Hood was in the seventy-fifth year of her age at the time of her death, her husband having predeceased her almost four years. She was the youngest daughter of the late Mr. John Leard, "Creek", Tryon, and of a large family of sons and daughters she is survived by one brother, Mr. Charles Leard, "Creek" who is now totally blind. For the past few years Mrs. Hood has resided with her niece, Mrs. George H. Galbeck, "North", Tryon, they being greatly attached to each other, and who cared for her as if she were her own beloved mother. Mrs. Hood was also very much in love with her Tryon and its people, in which place she lived, died and was buried. She was a true member of the Methodist Church there, and in her last days was attended by the pastor, Rev. G. M. Young. About two and a half weeks before her death she accidentally fell and injured her back. She seemed to recover and continued active until a half hour before she expired, when she became unconscious and slept away. She leaves to mourn, one daughter, Mrs. J. W. Callbeck, Summerside, and three sons W. H., J. P., and R. B., the two youngest of whom are in Calgary, and thus could not be present at her death or burial. Another beloved daughter, Miss Jennie, died suddenly in eighteen eighty nine at the age of twenty-three. The pall-bearers were Messrs William, Frank and Hedley Muttart and Wallace Lowther. On Dec. 11th, after a lingering illness of about a year she passed quietly away to her Maker the spirit of Mrs. John R. Larkin. Few residents of the western part of the Island were more widely known or esteemed than this good Christian wo-

man and, though she had survived the allotted span of the psalmist many who knew her well found it hard to realize that she was no more. They felt that her departure would leave too great a void in the field of her sterling usefulness. Ever cheerful and youthful, the clouds and burdens that worry human lives rarely rested heavily or deeply on hers; she had ever the kind greeting and the glad hand for those who approached her, and the many little winning qualities that gold cannot buy or affection assume were her natural endowments. The beautiful things of the world were not lost on her; she saw reflected in them the beauty of the Infinite Artist; she loved the flowers, the woods and the sparkling country streams—things that seem to appreciate and repay if inanimate things can the affection that they claim. On last Tuesday morning a large funeral procession followed her remains which were laid to rest in the quiet Catholic cemetery of Wellington under the shadow of St. Mary's of the Immaculate Conception—the church where she had so often knelt in prayer and which had so often known the offering of her pastor Rev. J. A. McDonald and the service at the grave performed by her life-long friend Rev. S. A. Boudreau of Egmont Bay. During her illness she was frequently visited and consoled by her pastor and the Rev. F. L. Connolly. The dark shadow of her death falls heavily upon her husband John R. Larkin, her daughter Mrs. Gillis, Sydney, C. B., her sons, Emmet with the colors in England and Bryon on the battle line on the blood-red field of France. Besides a legion of friends and acquaintances who will miss her for her cheerfulness, her charity and her countless Christian virtues. CANADIAN ESCAPES (Continued from Page Seven.) and at this point was himself spotted and taken prisoner. Passing through Lille, the clearing house for prisoners, he was sent to Muenster Camp, where he was in charge of men employed on stable work. In this camp Turcotte made two attempts to escape, as also did Nelson; "fact," said the latter, "that was the one aim we always had, and it helped us to bear what we had to go through." These attempts were unsuccessful, and the punishment was 21 days in a dark cell, on a diet of bread and water. Peter Nelson was taken prisoner just a year ago, and found himself also at Muenster Camp, though the two only met each other occasionally. After these attempts at escape they were sent to other camps of a rougher type; Turcotte was deported to one in Poland, near Riga, where he said men were flogged and ill-treated in a most brutal manner. As he showed unwillingness to play the bully with the men over whom he was put (being a sergeant) he was sent back to Muenster early this month. Quite undeterred by previous failures, and perhaps thinking of "third time lucky," Turcotte tried again, and on Friday evening, 10th November, he got out, and with him there also escaped a man from the Northumberland Fusiliers. Both men were fortunate in having been taken without being wounded, so that they were naturally agile and fleet-footed. During the next four days Turcotte nursed the darkness and fed upon turnips and anything else that he found in the fields. He was very cautious because on a previous occasion he had been captured when only six miles from Dutch frontier. The last lap towards the promised land was done in a swamp, but they got out, and although they recognized that they were now out of Germany, they forged ahead for two miles before they stopped to enquire. The enquiry was simply, "Holland—Deutschland?" and the answer of a farmer, "Holland," reassured them. The good-hearted Hollander gave them breakfast and took them down to the police, and the latter gave them food and shelter until their transfer to the British Consul was arranged. Fooled the Dogs. Peter Nelson of the 29th Battalion, Vancouver, had been sent to another camp not far from Muenster where drainage operations were the staple work. On Sunday evening, November
