**Man. Election Highlights**

**WINNIPEG, Oct. 15**—Service men within Manitoba's last week voted at 34 special polling stations. It was announced tonight that 1,364 votes were cast at the special polls, the largest number 680, in Winnipeg. They voted for candidates in home constituencies and their ballots were consolidated with the civilian list.

William Scraba, Coalition-Liberal Progressive candidate in Winnipeg, led the most novel election advertisement of all the candidates. It appeared on the sports pages of Winnipeg newspapers today, headed: "Vote off to the political races—you pick your horse on his performance." He then outlined a platform in few words: My platform: to advocate and support what I consider right; to denounce and oppose what I deem wrong, without fear or favor.

Another Winnipeg candidate, Spr. R. G. Sully, Coalition Conservative, in his first bid for public office advocated: "More beer, less foam in glasses." Recently returned from overseas, he told his nominating meeting that there was "too much" froth in Winnipeg beer.

Mrs. Margaret Walsh, 57, one of two women candidates in the Province, is a grandmother "and proud of it," Mrs. Walsh, nominated by all the Women's Liberal organizations in Winnipeg, is making her first bid for public office.

In Birtle where Mr. Bell was re-elected 11 of 15 polls showed: Bell 1008 Reid 679.

G. H. Grant, Coalition Liberal-Progressive, added another seat to the Government column when he was elected over L. V. Robson, C. O. in Glenwood which was represented in the last legislature by a Liberal-Progressive.

**NEW U. S. REGULATION**—The President of the United States has signed an Act which will interest many United States citizens living in Canada. Under the Nationality Act of 1940, as amended, naturalized United States citizens, with certain exceptions, would lose their nationality by residing continuously for three years in the territory of a foreign state of which they were formerly nationals or in which the place of their birth is situated, or five years in any other foreign state. However, the law also provided that loss of citizenship by such residence could not occur until October 14, 1945, regardless of the length of residence abroad. Under the Act just signed, the date has been extended and such citizens may remain outside the United States until October 14, 1946. This applies to all citizens of the United States who acquired American citizenship after birth whether by marriage, naturalization of a parent, or naturalization in their own right. It has no application to those persons who are American citizens from birth.
