The L. of C. squad which were also out for practice this week, has a bang-up roster to pick from and are bound to make this interesting for their other hockey opponents in the Provincial League.

Very little is known regarding the Alberton entry into the Island League this winter, but it is understood that the "Westerners" are fast rounding into shape and intend making the issue more than interesting for the other teams in the race for the Championship—Watch Alberton!

Taken all in all with the P. E. I. H. L. composed of Summerside, St. Dunstan's, Alberton, Abegweits and League of the Cross, it looks like a regular old-time hockey tournament—Well, go to it fellows, and may the best team win.

The American Olympic hockey team left Boston Tuesday night enroute to France where they will compete with other nations for world's amateur hockey honors. If "dope" counts for anything, this aggregation will be eliminated in short order when the games get under way "over there," as the team with the exception of "Red" Sinnott, who by the way is a member of the Canadian Hockey Club in Boston, is weak from the roller up. Only last Saturday the Boston sextette "tied the can" to them by a score of 3 to 1 in an exhibition game and again on Monday night Minneapolis shut them out to the tune of 2 to nil. Both these squads have been decisively whipped by touring "Canuck" teams, which today cannot carry sticks to the Granites.

It looks as though the interest in the American Olympics has lessened to quite an extent and around Boston as the boys, without any public demonstration whatever, departed to uphold the prestige and honor of their country in the sporting world. The Boston Post on the eve of their departure has this to say: A group of young men will gather at Back Bay station a few minutes before midnight tonight. A few friends will be there to see them off. But tonight these nine boys carry with them the hopes of the United States in the Olympic hockey competition in France. They will be battling against a dozen nations for the world's hockey supremacy. They represent these whole United States and deserve a fitting farewell, something they will remember when they are on foreign soil, or ice, fighting for the U. S. A. Perhaps when they return wearing the Olympic crown they will be met with a brass band. It will reflect no great credit if these United States Olympic hockey players are permitted to leave Back Bay station at midnight tonight without some expression of good will and good wishes by the city, state and nation—Expressing these boys return without the Olympic crown, what then? Crown or no crown, be sports, they are representatives anyway.

Quite an insight into the methods employed by the Olympics and some interesting comment on the players is given in the Toronto Star, as follows:

"In Jack Cameron and Ernie Collett, in goal they have two high-class net guardians—Cameron is a youngster, who is alert as a ferret, as cool as a chilibian and full of courage, agility and judgment. Collett is of a more nervous type, but he has been showing the best of his career this winter. The Dunc Munro-Beattie Ramsay defense is defensively the best combination in senior hockey today and offensively they have a punch to their rushes which makes them the outstanding feature of a grand team. The forward line has everything. Hooley Smith, the regular centre, is the Frank Nighbor of the amateur game. His poke-checking in mid-ice is a terror to opposing rushers, he back checks consistently and he is mighty smart going through a defense. He shoots well, in Harry Watson and Albert McCaffery, the regular wing men, the Olympics have a pair that would look sweet on any pro team in the country. Watson is a noted sniper and a speedy, consistent back checker. McCaffery, always a horse for work and especially valuable when a game has to be pulled out of the fire by sheer building courage and grit, has become a remarkably good goal-keeper, and right now is rated by keen critics as every bit as valuable a man as Watson, who has long been regarded as the best amateur forward in the O.
