## Vagaries of Fashion Affects Leather Trade

MONTREAL, Que., July 6.—The leather trade emphasizes the effect of climate and the vagaries of fashion in the manufacturing industry. In this connection it is pointed out by the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways that the climate of Great Britain is not favorable for the fabrication of good quality patent leather and that practically all supplies have to be imported, chiefly from the United States, Canada, Germany and the Netherlands. Canada has substantially increased her exports of patent leather to Great Britain during the past years, accounting for 44% of the total imports into Great Britain, an increase of 24% over 1931 and 33% over 1930, and Canadian patent leather dominates the market of the United Kingdom this year. Style also has its effect in certain trades. The growing vogue of the use of reptile skins for ladies shoes in recent years has reduced the demand for glace kid, although there is a considerable trade in this commodity. The British tanning industry absorbs the whole supply of native hides in the United Kingdom but this is insufficient to meet the needs of the industry and considerable quantities are imported. The principal supplying countries for dressed, wet, salted hides (ox and cow) are the Argentine Republic, Italy, the United States and the Irish Free State. The bulk of the dry salted hides comes from British South Africa, British India, the Argentine Republic and British East Africa. Sheep and lamb skins are imported chiefly from Australia, New Zealand and British South Africa. From information it would appear there is a possibility of Canada entering the trade for horsehides but it is pointed out that in making shipments the range of weight of hides and the average weight should be indicated as well as information as to whether the hides are long or short shank and how they are flayed. Box or willow calf is imported chiefly into the United Kingdom from the Continent, Germany, the Netherlands and France being the principle sources of supply. Canada is a relatively small supplier although during the past two years her exports have increased and there is opportunity for much greater expansion.
