The morning sermon was delivered by the Rev. T. M. Cumming at present connected with Y.M.C.A. War Services related to the Airport here.

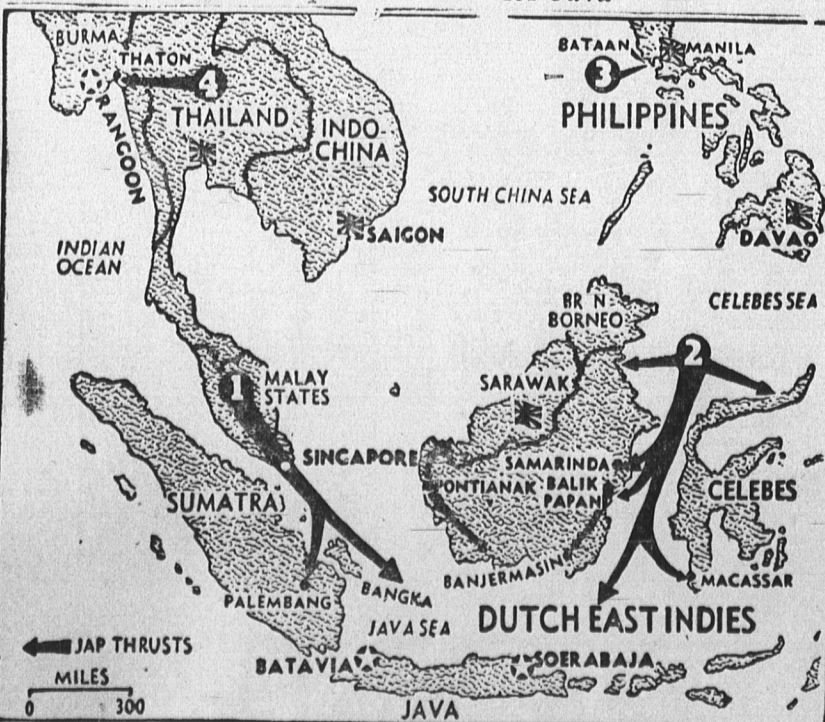

Where Japanese Strike for Java



Map shows how, using the pincer strategy perfected by the Nazis, the Japanese are driving to "encircle" Java, location of the United Nations' Southwest Pacific headquarters. The thrust down the Malay States (1) and through Singapore, has carried past Palembang, great Dutch oil center in Sumatra. Off shore, defending planes bombed Japanese warships and transports. To the east, the Japanese have driven through Macassar Strait (2) to set up bases to be used as stepping stones for the Java campaign.
