Ex-Kaiser's Poverty

BERLIN, August 15.—The former Kaiser is so hard up he is obliged to refuse countless requests for pecuniary assistance. The number of such requests is so great he has been obliged to have a circular letter printed in reply to the petitioners.

Die Freiheit prints the circular letter, which bears the reading, "Court Marshal of His Majesty, Kaiser and King, Doorn, Holland. "As is natural in view of the great amount of misery prevailing in our fatherland," the letter says, "the number of requests for assistance or loans received here daily is so great it is impossible to answer each request by separate letter owing to the lack of sufficient secretaries. The Court Marshal therefore finds himself compelled to answer by means of a circular letter. His Majesty Kaiser and King, has learned with the greatest sorrow of your case, but the means at his disposal for such ends are long since exhausted, and the economic conditions and the exchange rates are utterly destructive for our household here, since one gets on the average only four Dutch guilders (a guilder is worth 40c) for one hundred German marks."

Asia at Door Of White Man

PARIS, Aug. 15.—Dr. A. F. Legendre, a French writer on Chinese and Asiatic subjects gained from twenty-five years of travel and observation in the Far East, warns the world in his latest work that "Asia is at the white man's door."

The biggest cloud on the horizon of the future, he says, is the "yellow peril."

The white race, Dr. Legendre says, "lost face," as the Oriental says it, when Japan defeated Russia. During the great war he writes, Japan multiplied her resources and saved her strength while Europe lost 20,000,000 men and today suffers depressing intellectual, moral and economic debility. Great Britain, the author holds, erred in supporting Japan through her "marriage of reason," with the Pacific Empire an alliance "now proving so embarrassing."

"In view of the high cost of living in Holland it is barely possible to meet necessary expenses with German currency. His Majesty is unfortunately unable to grant the desired financial aid."

De Valera Hopes Ireland Will Accept The British Terms

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Correspondence between the British Prime Minister and Eamann De Valera was made public by the British Government this afternoon, which shows that while there is a deadlock on the question of independence in Ireland, negotiations are still open.

Great Britain offered Ireland complete autonomy on finance, taxation and military forces for home defence, and her own police among other things to control the Irish postal service.

In his reply to Lloyd George, De Valera argued for independence and offered to submit to Ulster questions and expressed the hope that Ireland would accept the British terms, and which he declared were the best that could be offered.

Priest Shot By Episcopal Preacher

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 15.—Because he married Ruth Stevenson, a protestant girl to a catholic, Rev. James E. Coyle for many years pastor of St. Pauls Roman Catholic church here, was shot and fatally wounded last night by Rev. Edwin S. Stevenson, Methodist Episcopal preacher and father of the girl.

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Throwing Money Brought Arrest

NEW YORK, August 15.—Olcides Montavon speaks but little English—French is his forte—but Olcides is "worth a million dollars" and does as he pleases. Even to the extent of tossing a fraction of the million away at Forty-second street and Sixth avenue and getting arrested for it.

It was up in the men's night court, Fifty-seventh street near Third avenue, and to Magistrate Sweetser that the bursting forth of Olcides from the humdrum of life was disclosed. Policeman Ryan of the West Thirtieth street station said that he thought Olcides was guilty of disorderly conduct. For he had been throwing coins—handfuls—to the populace. And witnesses said that Olcides had been tossing bills, like so much nothing, to the eager hands that stretched pavement on Broadway and Fifth avenue.

"Why did you do this?" asked Magistrate Sweetser, possibly calculating the pay a magistrate gets. Olcides shrugged a shoulder, then shrugged the other, and said in French that he spoke only the French. Nobody in night court could match him there. It appeared that an impasse had been reached. Then Olcides piped in English:

"I am worth a million dollars, and so I do as I please." The sentence was perfect, no trace of accent but it constituted Olcides' entire stock in English trade and his only defense.

Magistrate Sweetser said he thought Olcides was something that squirrels are fond of, but he had done no harm—"so let him go."

A large crowd from the night court followed Olcides.

Well Balanced Development Of Canada

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—History of the World shows more well balanced development of a great country that has been true of Canada," says the National City Bank in survey conditions in the Dominion.

With distances so great the only United States, Russia, Brazil can readily be compared with it, and with natural resources that require the hardest kind of pioneer to bring them the service of the world. It steadily has ahead working out its own salvation, until today it is in position to withstand the strain which the past war has brought.

Appreciative Criticism Of Action of King

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Action of the King in realizing capital on the Royal estates in the Duchy of Lancaster, to avoid the cost of the maintenance of the royal household falling further on the public funds, has produced appreciative criticism. The comment, however, is accompanied by a variety of viewpoints concerning some aspects of the question, more particularly the announcement of His Majesty that he is prepared if it is thought desirable, to make a curtailment of the splendor that has been usually associated with the British Throne.

The Daily Telegraph is convinced that the Government did right in advising the King that the people of not only Great Britain but of the whole Empire, desires that the dignity of the crown be fully maintained, without notable sacrifice of this character. It is not, says the Telegraph as if there was anything grandiose or unastutely lavish about the functions under the British monarchy.

The Daily News takes the opposite view, remarking that the British nation which was in its infancy when "these immemorial ceremonies" were inaugurated has since grown up.

The Westminster Gazette remarks that it is obvious that the whole position of the Royal Family

will require consideration at an early date. "Money goes into ceremonial and maintenance of atmosphere which must at times be irksome to the personages concerned," says the Gazette.

PARIS, Aug. 15.—Allied supreme council today decided to abolish the economic barrier on Rhineland on Sept. 15th, if many continues to pay promptly to war indemnities, but decided to maintain occupation on the bank of the Rhine and Ruhr until the next meeting of the council when the matter will be considered. The council concluded sessions late Saturday afternoon.
