A sad gloom was cast over South Freetown and vicinity when it became known that in the early hours of Friday morning, June 27th, Bruce Burns had passed on to his heavenly home.

Although sick for some time he seemed to be improving, and was up and about until stricken with a heart attack. His unexpected death came as a great shock to his family and friends. Death came painlessly and without a struggle making those who loved him realize that even in death God could be kind. Born in Freetown in 1879, the son of the late William and Ellen Burns, he spent the most of his days in that place. Starting at the bottom of the ladder, life was not always easy for him, but still he carried on, building up a happy and prosperous home in which young and old were always sure of a welcome.

Always true to any trust ever put in him, a firm believer in justice and right, he knew no creed, rich and poor were alike with Bruce; a good neighbor and a kind friend, he will be greatly missed in his home and community.

The first great sorrow to come into his life was the death of his only son, a bright lad of eighteen years. From this blow he never fully recovered.

That he had many friends was plainly shown by the large number of people who gathered from all parts to pay their respects and farewells to a loved comrade, and by the many, many messages of love and sympathy received by the sorrowing family.

He leaves to mourn his wife, formerly Ila Reeves; two daughters, (Florence) Mrs. Alfred Reeves, (Madeline) Mrs. Leslie Reeves, and an adopted son Elmer; also six grandchildren, namely: Jean, Dallas, Arlene, Faye, Lorna, and Carol Reeves, to mourn a dear husband and father, but, with a memory that time can never dim, he is also survived by the following brothers and sisters, namely: Joseph Burns, Pinehurst, Mass., who arrived home for the funeral; Arthur, Charlottetown, and Russell, Freetown; also Mrs. Walter Scott, Maine; Mrs. F.
