MARQUIS IS BURIED WITHOUT PRAYER. Shipped From France to England in Rough Deal Box—No Music at His Funeral.

LONDON, March 29.—After his pathetic death at Monte Carlo, the Marquis of Anglesley's homecoming was a sad one. No relatives, no friends, were at the Victoria station to receive the rough deal box containing the unpretentious looking coffin. When it arrived on Wednesday it was in the hands of the insurance men, who demanded permission to identify the body, for nearly \$1,000,000 was involved in insurance on the life of the late marquis.

A TALE OF THE ARMADA. The Blowing Up of the Florentina Galcon, the Florentina. Over three centuries ago a vessel of the Spanish Armada was blown up in Tobermory Bay, off the coast of the island of Mull. Recently numerous relics have been recovered from it by divers. They include old cannon, swords, pistols, plate and coins. The vessel was the Florentina, a Florentine galleon which came from the Levant, one of the Italian possessions of the King of Spain, and was commanded by one Perajia. After the defeat of the armada the Florentina was forced by bad weather and lack of provisions to put into Tobermory Bay. There Sir Lauchlan MacLean, who, because of his feud with his neighbors, had been made a "denounced rebel" by King James of Scotland, formed an alliance with the Spaniards. With the aid of a hundred soldiers from the ship and of his own followers the wild chieftain made war on neighboring clans for some time.

At last he received a message from Captain Perajia requesting that the Spanish soldiers be sent back at once, as he was preparing for sea. At the same time he heard that the provisions supplied to the Spaniards had not been paid for. Sir Lauchlan demonstrated with the Don for his injustice, and satisfaction was promised. On the strength of this the men were sent back, but MacLean, not relying entirely on the captain's promise, retained three of the soldiers as hostages till the debt should be paid. At the same time he sent one of his own men, Donald Glas MacLean, on board the Florentina to receive an adjustment of the demands of his people. Donald Glas when he went on board the ship was disarmed and made prisoner, and no communication was allowed between himself and his friends. But Donald Glas conceived a plan which, though it meant certain death to himself, promised a speedy and terrible retribution to his captors. Finding that the cabin in which he was confined was close to the magazine, he forced his way into it, and laying a train from it to the outside, he fired it. The ship was blown to pieces, killing the 300 or 400 persons who were on board.

SILVER NUGGET FOUND. TORONTO, March 29.—A nugget of almost old silver, 25 inches long, 12 inches wide and 2 inches thick, weighing 80 pounds and valued at about \$380 has arrived at the offices of Director of Mines, Gibson, from the Trethewey Cobalt Silver Mine, on the Temiskaming Railway, from which neighborhood, since the discovery of veins there, some \$500,000 worth of ore has been shipped.
