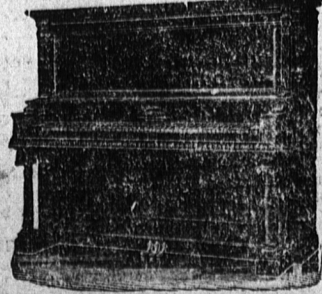

## GRAPHIC PICTURE OF THE GREAT WAR

Graphic pictures of the Great War led in striking manner with dolings of Canadian troops.

It would take columns of space in a newspaper to describe the hundreds of exciting incidents shown in "Canada's Fighting Forces," the six reel official film of the Canadian Government which will be shown at the Prince Edward today and tomorrow only, with Corporal White, D. C. M., hero of Ypres and St. Julien as speaker, describing life in the trenches and the dangers of the firing line as the motion pictures are thrown on the screen. This is the first chance that the Canadian public has had to see pictures of the war that are undoubtedly genuine, and they are assured by the management that not a single foot of the film shown in this series has ever been exhibited before. It was taken by one Canadian officer, Lieut. D. J. Dwyer, 30th Batt., C. E. F., who, directly under the instruction of the Department of Militia and Defence, took a complete motion picture record of the life of Canadian boys in khaki overseas, from the time of embarkation, through periods of training in England, and then in trench work. The boys and men of the first and second contingents, some of them from this region, may be easily recognized on the screen, and no one who has a loved one at the front fighting for King and Canada should miss this opportunity of seeing what the Maple Leaf boys are really doing to make history. Hundreds of prominent Canadians are shown—Generals Carson and Turner, Sir Robert Borden, Sir Sam Hughes, practically all the field officers, and many of the Canadian nursing sisters appearing in the pictures. A review of 40,000 Canadian troops by his Majesty the King, and the King's visit to the wounded, the Duchess of Connaught's Canadian Hospital, a visit by gallant King Albert and President Poincare of France to the Canadian boys, the explosion of hand grenades when thrown toward an enemy trench only 120 feet away, and the truly remarkable block system representation of the battle of Ypres and St. Julien are among the events recorded. 7484

## MMF. DARE-DEVIL MURDERED AS HEROINE

PARIS, Feb. 21.—Mme. "Dare-Devil" is dead. Mme. Dare-Devil was the name given by French soldiers to Mme. Meunier, the wife of a farmer at Lessart, not far from Nanteuil-le-Haudouin, where the English troops passed September 2 under the pressure of continually multiplying German troops on their left flank. The peasants of Lessart, most of them, piled their personal effects into carryalls and carts and fled before the conflict. Mme. Meunier, however, refused to budge. Solidly braced against her door sill, she turned a deaf ear to all appeals. She remained alone there with her old mother; she buried her choice provisions, her wine and bottles of old brandy, in the garden, bought a pistol for personal defence, and waited for the Germans.

From the surrounding country, there succeeded wave after wave of thick ranks of gray. Five army companies, nearly 300,000 men, marched through that region toward the Marne. In the early morning hours of the next day a German officer knocked on the door of Mme. Meunier's farmhouse with the tilt of his sword. "I must have milk, bread, meat, wine, salt, pepper, for my men," he cried. "The gun first, my fellow," ordered Mme. Meunier. She seized the rifle, unloaded it, installed the German in her cart, and ten minutes later arrived at the hospital of Nanteuil, now surrounded by French Chasseurs. "I bring you a prisoner," but I am going to keep the gun! When my husband comes back from the war it will be proof to him that I have not simply remained at home twiddling my thumbs." Mme. ## ARRESTED, HE LEARNS HE IS \$400,000 HEIR

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—Keith Edward Dalrymple wore flashy clothing, and for this reason was taken to the police station by detectives. Had it not been for this, Dalrymple would not have known that he was heir to \$400,000 and that the police of the country had been on the lookout for him for four years to tell him so.

The Bureau of Identification gave up nothing of a damaging character in its references to the young man—he is twenty-three years old—but it did not develop of an old circular seeking him. Young Dalrymple ran away from his home at Sloom Springs, Ark., in 1908. His father prospered in the oil business and moved to Port Alleghe, Pa., where he died four years ago. After leaving home young Dalrymple worked at Buffalo and Detroit. He came to Chicago ten days ago.

Violating all orders by her audacity, Mme. The next day and the following, and for ten days thereafter, Mme. Meunier passed through the German lines every day with her charge of provisions for her proteges in the hospital at Nanteuil-Haudouin. On September 12, on the road from Nanteuil to Lessart, her old cart was suddenly caught in a storm of shells. The Germans all around under brief and nervous orders, were forming columns, hitching their horses to their field guns. Within a short distance from her farmhouse—Mme. Meunier picked up the fuse of a shell. It was a French fuse and she believed that the deliverance of the region was near at hand. That night Mme. Meunier remained up to watch the German retreat under the gallant fire of the famous French three inchers, and before morning counted a score or more of the gray-coated men, who had passed by a few days before, waiting burial on the high road. At one place she dug out out of her cart and found a German soldier wounded with his rifle beside him.

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that the airship was going southward from the region of St. Menchould when French guns at Revigny shelled. At least one of the missiles found its mark in the huge aircraft which took fire and fell in the vicinity of Brandant Le Roi.

The Germans near Lillons to south of the Somme River met a repulse at the hands of the French in an intended attack extending over about four one-third miles. The offensive movement was preceded by a heavy bombardment and clouds of asphyxiating gases. When German infantry endeavored to come out of their trenches for the attack a barrier of fire and fire from French riflemen stopped them everywhere. The Germans in Artois prevented from occupying the counter offensive of the French.

In Champagne forest of Argonne in the entire region of Verdun there was such artillery activity which excels resulted in considerable destruction by French gunners. The Germans report additional repulses of British grenades attacks against captured positions along the Yser Canal also putting down entente allied offensive along Lens Arras Road. Numerous fights in the air between French and German aviators have taken place. Paris reports several German machines brought down by fire from French airmen. Aeroplane raids have been carried out by French and British notably on the German aviation field at Habsheim at Mulhausen and a munitions factory at Pagny Sur Moselle. British aircraft bombed the town of Don Southwest of Lille.

There has been little fighting on the Eastern Austro-Italian fronts. Albanians fighting the Turks are reported to have reached the Adriatic Sea west of Savaya. This would indicate that the Austro-Hungarians and their Allies are completely surrounded at Durazzo in Asia Minor the Russians are persistently following the Turks who fled from Erzerum and are also pushing their way northward from the captured fortress to the Black Sea with the purpose of establishing a base for warships and transports. Battles Lake Van has been captured by Russians. A Turk power station on the Ottoman front, east of Suez Canal, has been blown up by British aviators.

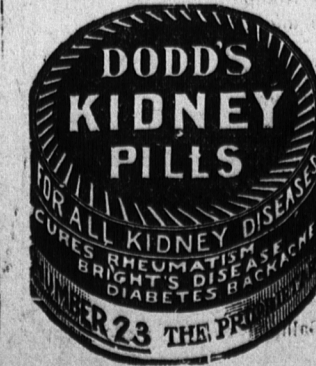
