ANOTHER ONE.—Another is to be added within a few days to the number of motor cars in Charlottetown, which is approaching the half-century. The latest addition is to be a seven-seater Cadillac, 1914 model.

DREDGING.—Mr. V. T. Bartram, head of the Toronto firm which has the contract of dredging for the Marine Slip way at Southport, is in the city. The company's dredge, the E. B. Hall, which wintered at Charlottetown, is now all in readiness to take up the work as soon as fine weather sets in permanently. This firm is now completing the dredging of the Channell at Murray Harbor, the contract of which they secured last Autumn. Their plant is being taken to Murray Harbor today to finish up this work.

CANADIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS.—In connection with the Canadian Athletic championships that, as already stated in The Guardian, are to be held here this year and will be arranged in conjunction with the celebration of Confederation to take place in Charlottetown on 18, 19 and 20th August next, the Abegweit Athletic Club, which has charge of the arrangements for the championships, has appointed the following as a general committee to carry out these arrangements: Dr. H. D. Johnson (President of the A. A. U. of C.), chairman; Dr. Yeo, Messrs. R. B. Brown, W. A. Gaudet, J. A. McMillan, W. B. Prowse, J. R. Darke and L. B. McMillan. In addition to this general committee two sub-committees will be appointed, one to deal with the advertising of the event, and the other with the question of entertaining the visiting athletes, arranging for their accommodation, etc. The intention is to invite representatives from every section in the Athletic Union, of which there are seven sections, the Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. A grant will be made to each of the Branch Unions towards the expense of sending their athletic representatives down to the Island, but there will be no limit placed upon the number of these representatives. Besides the Provincial committees there will, of course, be a large number of delegates from the United States and other places outside of the Dominion, and for the accommodation of all of these provision will have to be made.

RUSTICO.—North Rustico may well be proud of one of her young men in the person of Mr. Peter P. Pineau. Mr. Pineau, who has never taken a course in engineering nor in machinery of any kind understands the most complicated parts of gasoline engines so common in this section, especially among the fishermen (marine engines). Mr. Pineau's experience, although of late, has been put to the test when on the 27th of April, (setting day) scores of fishermen with disabled engines called on him from the first hour of the morning until eight o'clock the hour set for the departure to the fishing grounds. Mr. Pineau has in few minutes started every engine under his supervision which was greatly appreciated and no doubt highly remunerated. In as much as he is a credit not only to North Rustico but to himself and moreover he takes the place of experts who could be got only with difficulty.—Mr. Simon Pineau, was in the city on Friday last on business and remained until Saturday.—Mr. Joseph P. Pineau who has spent the winter in the United States returned home in North Rustico where he will enter as a clerk in Mr. E. C. LePage's store, a position which he previously occupied.—Mr. Adolphe Gauthier is retiring from the service of Mr. E. C. LePage and hiring in the service of Mr. Simon Pineau.—The codfish business in North Rustico has a bright future even for the coming summer, in spite of the lack of proper facilities of transport.—R.
