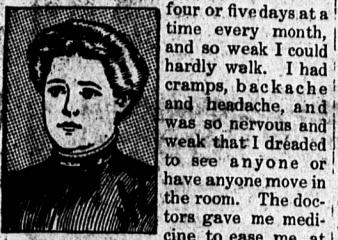

OTTAWA, June 14.—Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, will probably accompany R. L. Borden and Mr. Hazen to London to take part in the conference with the admiralty regarding Canadian participation in the naval defense of the empire. Mr. Doherty would represent the views of the province of Quebec, his sound judgment and thorough knowledge of the situation being of great value in the discussions.

Mr. Pelletier, who will also cross the Atlantic, will confer with the British government on postal and cable matters.

The government has let a contract for 40,000 tie plates for the Hudson Bay railway, the successful tender being the Algoma Steel company. The work will be pressed to completion as rapidly as possible.
