*RED POINT.—Cropping is about completed, and timely showers make ideal growing weather which encourage the farmers in their arduous duties.—Cod fish struck on the Southern Coast on the 4th inst., and good catches are daily made. At Basin Head one of the best fishing places on the Coast, large quantities are landed by the old fishing firms of Robertson, LaPierre, William Coffin and Seth McLean, joined on the east by Joshua McDonald and Lorne Kennedy and on the west by Fraser and McInnis, while the Red Point Cove famous for its fishing and fishermen for three quarters of a century is occupied by the Bruce Brothers, Jerome Chapman, Sister Robertson and Peter Rose and John McLellan, the latter of whom has spent nearly fifty years in the business. Farther west, the Sutherland John P. McInnis and William Sutherland occupied the ground.—No lobster factory is on the south side east from Little Harbor, a sound cooperative one existing there, three traps go east as far as Red Point and they are doing fairly well. Every available spot on our North Shore from East Point, west is occupied by lobster factories and they are making the best catches for years. Nearly all now use gasoline as a motive power and it certainly is much easier on the fishermen, and enables him to catch more fish.

Austrian's miscalculation of the Russian strength. The Lutsck environs were heavily fortified, and only fell after a twenty hour battle, but the Austrians did not expect the fall of the town. "It has not suffered, because after the fortifications were outflanked, the Austrians were utterly nonplussed, taking to headlong flight offered no resistance in the town but fled westward with the Russians at their heels. "The Russians entered Lutsck at 8.30 in the evening. The Archduke Frederick had dined at noon. The Archduke Ferdinand, however, more wary, left the day before. "When the pursuers had passed through the town and the Russian reserves marched in to music, extraordinary scenes were witnessed in the streets. Men, women and children threw themselves on the necks of the rescuers and the whole town cheered. It is evident that the stories of Austrian lack of food were not exaggerated.

Are they plentiful this spring? I will write no more for this time but I hope to hear from you soon I wish to thank you a thousand times for the socks.

GREAT TRIUMPHS OF RUSSIAN FORCES

LONDON, June 13.—(New York World)—"The Russians are piling victory on victory" says a Daily News despatch from Petrograd. "Prisoners are piling through Kiev on the way to the interior. The Russian advance is continuing steadily in spite of the great difficulty of transports.

"It must be remembered that almost everywhere the Russians have crossed the rivers separating their system of communications from the Austrians. They have had to bridge not merely for infantry, but for heavy gun transport, for the whole fighting force swept forward in pursuit of the Austrians.

"The bridges are built with tree trunks, the axe is the only tool used and the Russians are the only people who can use the axe with such rapidity and skill. The astonishing speed and development of the original success is largely due to the marvelous axe work of the Russian engineers.
