## THE DYE POT SAVES MONEY.

If you have any good but soiled white blouses of which you have become tired, why not dye them to match some skirt for which you need a separate waist? To make the dyeing a success rip all close plaits or trimmings so the liquid may penetrate into the folds and creases. Do not attempt to dye a soiled or dusty article. Wash it first in the usual way, then rinse thoroughly and allow it to get three parts dry before dipping into the dye. Four boiling water on the dye and stir thoroughly before placing the article in the liquid. When you lift the article out of the dye rinse thoroughly in clean cold water and hang out dripping wet in the open air. Do not wring it, whatever you do, and be very careful in hanging up the article so that the clothing will not leave any mark on it.

## SPORTING NEWS

### SHOOTING

#### CHARLOTTETOWN BEATS SUMMERSIDE.

Yesterday afternoon in Charlottetown rifle range, a return rifle match took place between teams of the Summerside Rifle Club and the Charlottetown Rifle Club of Charlottetown. To the general satisfaction of riflemen of this city the Charlottetown team emerged victorious, though it is true that they just got home first, the winning margin being only one point. Thus though being defeated the visiting team were not disgraced.

The match was a most interesting one, arousing considerable excitement as it progressed among the large number of shooting enthusiasts who were present on the range.

The Summerside team arrived by special train, which came in to Charlottetown at 4.15 p.m. They immediately proceeded to the rifle range. The weather conditions were favorable. The light was good, while the wind blew up the range, being fairly steady in its strength and direction. As was to be expected from the fact of there being many of the best riflemen in the province shooting, there was some splendid individual marksmanship. Top score at the 200 yds. range was made by one of the Charlottetown team, Major Jones, who got 33 out of 33; while there were two scores of 33 and four of 32 points. At the end of the shooting on this range, the Charlottetown men were found to be leading by three points, the totals being Charlottetown 247 and Summerside 244; the respective averages being 30.8 and 30.5 points per man. More excitement was witnessed at the 300 yards range, two possibilities being scored, hitting one by a member of each team; on the Summerside team it was Dr. Leard and for Charlottetown, Professor Barlow. The interest in the match quickened when it was seen that at this range the visiting team had taken the lead, having made a total of 252 points to 246 by the Charlottetown team, the respective averages being thus 31.5 and 30.75 per man.

When the teams went down to the last range, 600 yards, the Summerside team was leading by three points, and excitement ran high when in the first stage of shooting at this range the scoring seemed pretty level. With great interest the finish was awaited and when the last shot was fired, the result signalled, and the scorecard handed in to the range officer, there was a general gathering of the spectators around that official to hear the result. It was with no little enthusiasm on the part of the Charlottetown team that they heard they had won the match; with satisfaction of equal amount no doubt, the visiting team learned that they lost the match by only one point.

The best individual score here was made by that magnificent shot, Major Jones, who got 33 points and finished with a total of 98 points. This was top score of the match, and with it the Major won the silver table spoon offered by Mr. Sidney Grey to the highest individual score of the match. The respective range totals at 600 yards were: Charlottetown, 223 points and Summerside, 219 points; the averages being respectively, 27.87 and 27.37 points. The grand totals were: Charlottetown 716 pts., Summerside, 715 pts.; the respective averages being 89.5 and 89.37 pts.

As each side has now a victory to its credit, it is proposed that there should be a third match to decide the rubber, and it has been settled that this is to take place on the Summerside range within the next fortnight.

At the conclusion of the shooting there was an adjournment to the club bungalow, where Professor Barlow, the president of the Charlottetown Club, handed over to Major Jones the spoon presented by Mr. Grey.

On the call of Mr. Monkley, the Summerside team gave three hearty cheers for the winners, who as cordially returned the compliment.

The duties of range officer at the match were discharged by Major Leiph, while Majors Bartlett and Weeks acted as assistant range officers.

There was a pleasing social side to the event, the visiting team being entertained at the Victoria Hotel by the Charlottetown club.

Last evening at the J. A. A. grounds, Charlottetown, one of the best baseball games played this season took place between picked teams from Summerside and Charlottetown. The game was exciting from start to finish, containing a grand number of errors, and both teams shared the honor of some brilliant plays. The game started at 6.40, the Charlottetown boys won the toss and Summerside went to bat first. In the first inning both sides were retired in quick order.

In the second inning the Summerside boys succeeded in getting one run. Lyle did the trick in splendid style. He sent out a good one and got to first, then the ball was overthrown and he succeeded in getting to third safely. Godkin next put a nice ball in the air which was cleverly caught by Sweeney. The next man got to first and his successor put out a good one and Lyle, amid loud applause scored the first run. The next two were struck out, retiring the side, Charlottetown met hard luck and failed to score. Inning ended, Summerside 1 Charlottetown 0.

In the third both sides were retired in quick succession, the excellent work of both pitchers causing no one to get past 2nd,abase.

The 4th inning was a tie, both sides having got two runs, Rogers was first up for Summerside and was struck out. Lyle got to first and the next man was struck and admitted to first. The next man struck the ball out nicely and Lyle went home for run No. 2. The next man did likewise and another run was the result, while the next two were struck out retiring the side.

Charlottetown boys came to bat and things looked blue when Whitlock and Martin were each struck out. Sweeney got to first however and then Milford made the prettiest play of the evening. He drove a dandy one to the back of the field, Sweeney got home and he got to third where the ball was overthrown and Milford got home. The next man was out and the 4th inning ended, Summerside 3 Charlottetown 2.

The fifth inning was similar to the third and the both sides were retired in quick succession.

The sixth inning ended without any change. The exceptional work of Campbell who did not allow a man to reach first base in this inning is worthy of mention. Rogers of Summerside made the prettiest catch of the evening and both sides were retired, the score standing as before, Summerside 3, Charlottetown 2.

In the 7th and last inning which was to decide which team should be the winner, the Summerside boys met with hard luck and were all struck out in quick order. At this point, Garret, the Catcher for the home team was struck on the knee by the ball and had to retire, he was replaced by McAleer. The Charlottetownians were then up and Sweeney the first man was struck out. Milford came to bat next and got safely to first, stole second and third Campbell came next and with two strikes against him, Milford came home on a passed ball, tying the score amid thunderous applause. Lou got to first and also stole 2nd and 3rd. The next man up got to first, next man got to first and he succeeded in scoring. The next man up was McCarey up next and at the most critical period of the game when strike two was called Campbell made a wild dash for home while the catcher was returning the ball to the pitcher. The pitcher threw the ball,

which was caught and dropped at the same time that Campbell crossed the plate for the winning run. He was seized by the jubilant fans and cheered and cheered while the others were treated the same in turn. Thus the game ended immediately after the winning run. ### JUMPS 1,000 FEET IN SAFETY FROM AEROPLANE.

Airmen are beginning to pay more attention to safety devices than was the case in the early history of aviation and new devices for insuring the stability of aeroplanes, for protecting the airman against injury in case of accident, and for descending in safety from a crippled or unmanageable machine are being developed throughout the world.

A spectacular test of one of the new safety devices was made in California on June 20, and is described in the August Popular Mechanics Magazine. A young woman jumped from an aeroplane at a height of more than 1,000 ft. and landed safely on earth without the slightest injury. The apparatus she used is known as a "safety pack." It is a parachute of very thin but strong silk fastened to a mesh made of Italian hemp and so folded into a canvas case that it opens at the slightest pull. The entire pack weighs but 11 lb. and is designed to be attached to the shoulders of the airman or his passenger, ready for instant use.

The moon sets tonight at 9.48. There was a new moon on Thursday, Aug. 2nd, at 5.58 a. m. The first quarter of the moon will be on Saturday, Aug. 9th, at 12.03 a. m. The length of today will be fourteen hours and thirty-four minutes.
