Mrs. Beryl Hart And
Navigator Make
Safe Landing In
Hamilton Harbor On
First Leg of Trans-
Atlantic Flight.

CHARLOTTETOWN, Bermuda, Jan. 7.—
A white monoplane Trade Wind,
piloted by Mrs. Beryl Hart, was driven
out of gray skies to a safe
landing in Hamilton harbor this afternoon,
completing the first leg of
the flight from Norfolk, Va.,
to Bermuda. Its motor roared again
as soon as the pontoons touched
the water and its red-haired
pilot, Mrs. Beryl Hart, drove the
plane upward from the choppy seas
to a safer spot in front of
the hangar on Hinson's Island. The
landing was made six hours and
fifty minutes after the take-off
from Hampton Roads, Mrs. Hart and
navigator were eager tonight to con-
tinue to the Azores as soon as the
plane is ready, which may be to-
morrow.

Revelations At Investigation Of Insubordination

LONDON, Jan. 7.—The Plymouth
correspondent of the Daily Mail as-
serts such startling revelations have
come out of investigation into an act

cruise Thursday have been cancell-
ed. An order tonight cancelled the
sailing of the Lucia, 30 members of

ENCOURAGING REPORT OF FOX BREEDERS ASS'N

Canadian National
Breeders Have Now
Membership of 6,552.

The year of 1930 shows considerable activity in the silver fox farming industry in Canada, notwithstanding general depressed world conditions. The Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association has had a successful year.

This organization, one of the youngest breed organizations in Canada being only ten years old has now a membership of 6,552 embracing every Province in Canada. There are some 4,500 ranches and 107,500 adult foxes under inspection. Applications were filed this year for 11,000 puppies.

Inspection work started in August with fifty three inspectors in the field and was completed about December 15.

To encourage the breeding of higher grade animals, the Association has for years conducted the fox section of the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto and during the last two years have made grants to Regional fox shows. This year, Amherst and Saskatoon received the grant for this purpose.

While at the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, the Association conducted a booth where there were displayed some of the finest pelts. It is also proposed to have a booth at the British Empire Exhibition at Buenos Aires showing the outstanding quality of Canadian silver fox pelts.

The Association has also been active in making representation to the Railway Board for reduction in freight rates on fox foods.

Notwithstanding the increased number of pelts marketed and the depressed market for furs generally, silver fox furs brought fairly good prices and the demand was keen.

The fur Marketing Department of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association is another branch of the work that has been looking after the cleaning, lotting, valuing, and selling of silver fox pelts for its members. Last year this Department handled some 11,500 fox pelts and this year it is expected the number will greatly increase. In addition to the regular selling channels through the Sale Houses of Montreal and London, the Marketing Department will for the first time have pelts sold through Paris fur auctions and a representative of the Association is now on the high seas to attend this and the London sales.—S.

THE INDIA ROUND TABLE CONFERENCE

LONDON, Jan. 7.—Hindus, Moslems and Europeans of India joined this afternoon in support of the scheme of home rule for India, which was laid before the Round-Table Conference some days ago by Sir Tej Bahadur Sapru. The same plan, in its essentials, was accepted by Lord Reading on behalf of the British Liberal delegates, but was received by the British Conservative delegates coldly and non-committally.

Garvin Jones, president of the European Association of India, before the conference committee this afternoon, described the present Government of India as hopeless and humiliatingly weak. The country was drifting into chaos, he said. He could see no way out, but to give a larger measure of responsibility to the Indian Legislature.

Sir Bhupendra Mitra, one of India's leading financial experts, thought no greater safeguards should be imposed on the Indian Government than were imposed on Canada, when she was created a Dominion. Sir Bhupendra, indeed, termed the new administration "the Dominion Government of India."

Between Four And Five Million Are Unemployed

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—After waiting for weeks for snow nearly 9,000 unemployed men are engaged in digging the city from under the worst blizzard in seven years. The city is prepared to spend \$150,000 from the snow removal fund to clear the streets. The street cars operated fairly regularly, but other traffic was tied up.

LONDON, Jan. 7.—The Prince of Wales and Prince George, his brother, will start on their voyage to South America Saturday, Jan. 17. It was officially announced today. They will go from here to Santander to board the liner Orpesa, which sails Sunday.

Princess Arthur of Connaught
Afterwards come the Earl of MacDuff, son of Princess Arthur; Lady Maud Carnegie, her sister; Hon. James Carnegie, infant son of Lady Maud; and finally Princess Victoria, the unmarried sister of His Majesty.

SECOND WHEEL OF RANAHAN'S PLANE FOUND

Pilot With Two Com-
panions Who Disap-
peared Oct. 28, Belie-
ved Lost.

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, Jan. 7.—A second wheel belonging to the aeroplane piloted by Robin Renahan, who disappeared October 28 with two companions, near Prince Rupert, B. C., was found today near Point Davidson, 15 miles south of here, by a plane dispatched by the Ketchikan Chronicle. The first wheel was found a week ago by a hunting party on the beach at Annette Island, near Ketchikan Island.

While aviation authorities have expressed the belief that the wheels were dropped to lighten the ship as ice formed on the wings, others feared the finding of the second wheel meant disaster for Renahan and his pals.

George F. Perley And C. R. Harnett As Census Heads

OTTAWA, Jan. 7.—It is definitely understood that George F. Perley, Secretary of the Ottawa Liberal-Conservative Association, is to be appointed Dominion census commissioner for Ottawa and that C. Roy Harnett, of Westboro, will be census commissioner for Carleton County.

The appointment of more than 250 census commissioners will be made this month, and next month the commissioners will be instructed in their tasks in the work of taking the census of the Dominion.

It is expected that more than 10,000 enumerators will be named to do the actual work of taking the names, ages, nationalities, etc., of the people of Canada. These appointments will be made in April and May so that the appointees can start their work in June when the actual census-taking will begin.

The census commissioners will be paid on a sliding scale running from \$800 up, while the enumerators will receive a fee of so much per name.

R. H. Coak's Dominion statistician will be in charge of the taking of the census and already his office has been deluged with applications for work.

Four U.S. Customs Men are Suspended

OTTAWA, Jan. 7.—Officials of the National Revenue Department today confirmed Montreal reports to the effect that four officers of the customs service had been suspended. Serious irregularities had been disclosed as a result of a sweeping investigation instituted by Hon. E. B. Ryckman, Minister of National Revenue, and while full reports had not yet been received, the nature of those irregularities were such that the four officials concerned were suspended pending completion of the enquiry. It was stated by departmental officials today that serious discrepancies had been revealed in connection with the entry and delivery of imported goods.

Not Excessive N. B. Legislature Opens Feb. 12th.

Department, however, did not admit the Canadian Government's contention that the restrictions being imposed by American officials were excessive.

Dominion Govt. Will Pay 95 P. C. Old Age Pensions

Assurances Given By Premier
Bennett That The Provinces
Would Be Called Upon To Pay
Only 5 Percent As Compared
to 50 Percent Now Contributed

WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 7.—The Dominion Government in future will pay 95 per cent of the cost of old age pensions, it was revealed today by Hon. John Bracken, Premier of Manitoba. Mr. Bracken, in commenting on the Western Premiers conference here today with Prime Minister R. B. Bennett, disclosed that assurance had been given by Mr. Bennett that the provinces would be called upon to pay only five per cent of the old age pensions charges as compared with the 50 per cent now contributed. Mr. Bennett in his election speeches had promised relief for the provinces in the cost of old age pensions, and Mr. Bracken in his comment today said: "With regard to old age pensions, the Prime Minister amplified his previous statement and made it clear that the Dominion would pay 95 per cent of the cost."

Legislation, it is indicated, providing for the larger payment by the Federal Government, will be introduced at the forthcoming session of Parliament. In commenting on the conference, Premier Bracken said: "With respect to the agricultural situation, Mr. Bennett thoroughly understands the seriousness of the difficulties facing the West. I should much prefer that any further statement concerning the Dominion policies relating to this question should come from Mr. Bennett himself. Mr. Bracken said the natural resources discussion with Mr. Bennett was quite satisfactory to all, resulting in clearing up many minor difficulties, and he also revealed that the Prime Minister had requested the provinces to be represented at the Dominion Conference, in Ottawa, for a discussion of questions raised at the Imperial Conference."
