IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JAMES McMILLAN

Many of her old friends on Prince Edward Island have heard with sincere regret of the death, on January 4th, at Seattle, Washington, of Mrs. James MacMillan, a former resident of this Province.

Mrs. MacMillan, Miss Catherine Ann Wilson, was born at West River, Queens County, about sixty-five years ago, being the daughter of the late Hugh Wilson and of his wife Eliza McDonald. Having received her early education at the public school of her native district, she later spent some years at a boarding school in Seattle.

Not long after going west, Miss Wilson married James MacMillan, native of St. Peter's, Prince Edward Island. Theirs was an ideally happy home and about it centred for many years the little colony of “Islanders” who had settled in Seattle. Around their hospitable board, old friendships were renewed and new ones formed, and it will be long before Mrs. MacMillan's name will be forgotten by the many, who were privileged to enjoy the charm of her friendship and the graciousness of her hospitality.

Last September Mrs. MacMillan suffered a slight shock of paralysis, from which she never fully recovered. Neither medical skill nor tender nursing could check the progress of the malady, and she gradually grew worse, until death put an end to her suffering at the beginning of the new year. She was encouraged and fortified during her long illness by the kindly ministrations of the good Redemptorist Fathers, of whose parish she was a devoted member, and by the loving care and solicitude of her husband and children.

She leaves to mourn, besides her grief-stricken husband and his brother Angus, in Seattle, an older brother, William A. Wilson, of Jamaica Plains, Boston, and one sister, Mrs. Mary MacKinnon of Rollo Bay, Prince Edward Island. To this latter, especially her many friends here offer heartfelt sympathy in the loss of her only sister who sleeps her last long sleep in the shadow of the Holy Redeemer: Church in far-away Seattle. May she find comfort in the thought of that future day, when she will be united to the beloved sister and cherished companion of childhood and youth in their Heavenly Father's home, where sorrow and parting will be no more.
