AMHERST POPULATION ON INCREASE.

AMHERST, September 24—The annual census of Amherst has just been completed by Supervisor Lay, of the public schools, and the returns are exceedingly gratifying to the citizens of this town. The census was carefully taken, Mr. Lay visiting every home in the town, and on Monday night he made his official report to the council, which showed that the population of Amherst is now 10,250, an increase of 940 over the returns of last year. Ten years ago the population of Amherst was 5,740, and the very annual census has shown a steady and substantial increase.
The number of school age in town is just 2,000, and the town will at once have to grapple with the problem of providing more school buildings for the growing needs of the increasing population.

HOW CHINA USES OLD PAPERS.

(From the National Review.)
In the customs station of Newchwang for 1911 there appeared as a separate item under the heading of paper an importation of 4,311,372 lbs of old newspapers valued at \$1,138. This is a new feature. These old newspapers, which appear to be mostly British, are in extensive demand in the Newchwang district for wall paper for native houses and cottages.
Apart from this new development the importation of foreign paper was somewhat less in value though more in bulk than in 1910, but the difference is far more than balanced by a largely increased importation of paper of native manufacture. The local Chinese newspapers have enormously increased their circulation during the year. This is doubtless the reason for a greatly enhanced demand for printing paper, both of native and of foreign make of cheap quality.

PICKING OF APPLES.

It is time for Fruit Growers to pick their early Apples and other Autumn varieties if they are to be shipped to a foreign market. If they are left till they are fully ripe, they will not ship as well, and besides, a heavy gale will knock many of the off the trees. Care should be exercised in picking apples. They should be picked from the trees and placed in a basket, not thrown or handled roughly as it is sure to cause a bruise. None that fall from the trees should be out among apples that are intended for foreign shipment, as they are sure to go slack and spoil the whole barrel.
The Inspection and Sale Act, Part IX, requires that all closed packages containing fruit and intended for sale shall be marked with the name and address of the owner, with the name of the variety or varieties, and with a designation of the grade of the fruit such as "Fancy," "No. 1," "No. 2," or "No. 3." Of these the designation of the grade. The above Act describes very fully what is required and understood by the terms "fancy," "No. 1," "No. 2" and "No. 3," and all Fruit Growers should obtain a copy of this Act and thoroughly familiarize themselves with its requirements. No bruised, blemished or broken fruit can be included in the first three grades.
