A number of new trees have been planted, several new walks made and the old walks straightened and nicely graded, reflecting much credit on the Parks' Committee of the Town Council and especially on the chairman, Councillor McLellan, under whose superintendence the work was done.

Efforts were made by two tugs to tow it into shallow water, but without success, as it was built up on the sides and will not be easily raised, there being about thirty-five tons of mud on it, besides being partly full of water.

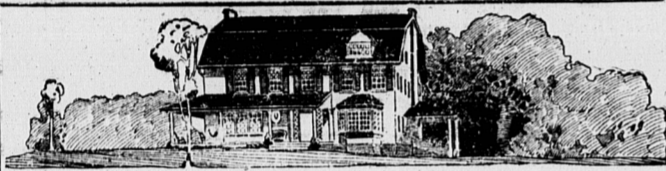

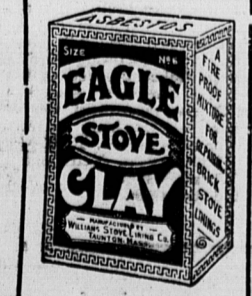

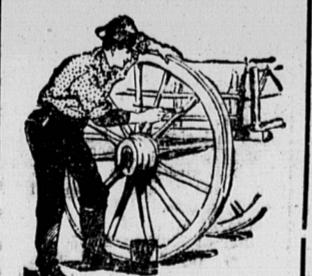
