Slippers To brighten black satin slippers and make them look like new, wipe with a cloth dipped in ammonia which has been wrung almost dry.

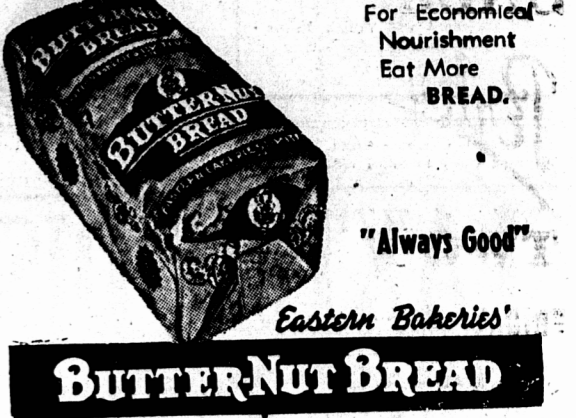
The Stars Say—

CHEESE PASTRY One and a half cups flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup shortening, 1/2 cup grated cheese, about 3 tablespoons cold water. Sift together flour and salt. Cut in shortening with a knife. Add cheese; mix well. Add enough water to hold ingredients together. Sprinkle evenly and mixing with fork to form balls. Roll out dough as required.

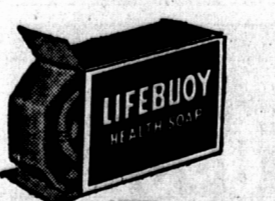
