SERIOUS REVOLT.

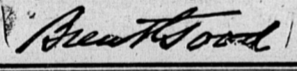
WILLEMSTAD, Island of Curacao, Oct 10.—The American steamship Mer-ida, which has arrived here from Maracaibo, brings news of a revolt in San Carlos prison, near Maracaibo, the prisoners burned the prison and killed several officials including the Warden, who was a brother of President Gomez. All the prisoners are said to be at large.

A gunboat has been sent from La-guaira to the scene of the trouble. There is great excitement among the Venezuelans in Curacao. It is thought that the escape of these prisoners may mean very shortly a revolution-ary movement in Venezuela as they include many prominent men of the Castro party, who were sent to the dungeons in August 1909.

The mail train arrived in this city last evening at ten ten, twenty min-utes late. Other inward trains were on time yesterday.

The postponed shoots of the Fourth Regiment, the Canadian Rifle League trophy and the spoon shoot will take place this afternoon.

The schooner Elva M., on her way to Campbellton to load lumber for this port was disabled by the heavy gale of yesterday and put into Sum-merdale harbor for shelter. The crew refused to proceed.

Yesterday the Knights of Colum-bus Council in this City celebrated the anniversary of Columbus Day, a large number of visiting members of the Council from Nova Scotia towns and points in this province and outside of Charlottetown having joined with the local members to as-sist in the celebration of the day. The day was not all that could be desired yet it interfered but little with the success of Columbus Day, 1910, and all members of this council who were privileged to take part in the days program will remember with pleasure many events which marked the celebration here. The first, second and third degrees were put on at different hours during the day and evening and many members were advanced to the rank of Mys-teries of the Knights. The work of the teams was commented on in a highly favorable manner. What was perhaps the most important part of the day's proceedings was the parade to divine service at 7.15 p.m. which could not be best measured in length by blocks, took a circuitous route from their hall on Queen Street marching to St. Dunstan's Cathedral headed by the Fourth Regiment Band. The inspiring music of the old Fourth was a pleasing fea-ture of the parade. At special request Rev. Dr. McLellan delivered a special address on the order, an address which was in keeping with the spirit of the day, and which was forceful and eloquent. At this service the choir, under the direction of Judge the members dispersed after an even-ing which was spiritually and social-ly refreshing. The members from out-side points will probably all leave or return to their homes today.
