Aerial Bomb Sale Proves Big Success Prince County People Buy 1.748 Bombs.

A special sale of aerial bombs, each represented by a \$50 bond in the Fourth Victory Loan, was held in Prince County yesterday and resulted in the sale of 1,748 bombs. They represented \$87,400 in cash. The sale was the first of its kind in the day would make the County total \$1,068,750.

The results of the sale will be reported to Provincial headquarters until today, it was learned. The big sale exceeded last night with a radio auction over station CHGS, a function which lasted several hours.

All during the day and up to the close of the radio sale, bids for aerial bombs came pouring in. Citizens from all parts of Prince farmers, laborers, fishermen, professional men, business houses in fact men, women and children from all walks of life kept the telephone lines busy with their bids for bombs. From the minute the radio sale was sung as a prayer, followed by the Lord's Prayer, a prayer for meditation and a prayer for the offering was received and dedicated. Many of the donors were from the St. Dunstan's Basilica. The sale was a great success and the P.C.U. members were greatly pleased with the results.
